Hon. Bert D. Nortoni.

HON. BERT D. NORTONI, candidate for judge of the St. Louis court of appeals by unanimous nomination, was born in New Cambria, Macon county, Missouri, January 26, 1867. He spent ten years of his life on a farm in Benton county, a fact which is to his advantage both physically and as a bond of common interest with the great mass of Missouri citizens. It was to his efforts as assistant U. S. district attorney that John P. Dolan, chairman of the Democratic city committee, Thos. E. Barrett, marshal of the St. Louis court of appeals and member of the Democratic state committee, and Frank Garrett, a St. Louis policeman, were convicted of fraud in obtaining bogus naturalization papers for use during the election of 1902. He has done prodigious work in the investigation of naturalization frauds, and has been instrumental in securing the indictment and imprisonment of Nathan Levin, president of the Hebrew branch of the Jefferson club, John Barbaglia, president of the Italian branch of the Jefferson club, Adolph Fern, vice-president of the Jefferson Hebrew club, Chas. Weissman, financial secretary of the same club, who plead guilty, and numerous others. It is notable in connection with his prosecutions that, unlike Mr. Folk, his work has stood the test of the supreme court.

He was nominated because of his record, his personal popularity and his unswerving devotion to duty. In the naturalization fraud cases it was shown by the records of the court of appeals that in one night in 1900 598 foreigners were made American citizens in five hours—two citizens a minute, and that in one night in 1902 211 foreigners were made citizens in three hours. Some of these men had been in the country only fourteen days. The way to stop these things is to make Bert D. Nortoni judge of the St. Louis court of appeals. Vote for Nortoni.

AMENDMENT NO. 5.
A light, temporary Tax for much needed New Capitol Building.

The voters of the state should bear in mind, at the coming election, and vote for constitutional amendment number 5, providing for the creation of a special fund for the building of a new state capitol. The middle section of the present building was erected in the year 1838, and the additions at the end were made about twenty years ago. It is inadequate for the present and future wants of the state; besides, is not a fire-proof structure, and is lacking in vaults and other facilities for the proper care and keeping of the public records of the State. The adjoining states of Iowa, Kansas, Illinois have all fine modern state capitols, erected in recent years, and which reflect credit on the citizens of those states. Arkansas has one in the course of construction. Missouri outranks all of these states with the exception of Illinois in population and wealth, and exceeds Illinois in area. The contemplated tax for the new state capitol is neither a permanent nor a heavy one. It is to continue for only five years, and if the amendment is adopted, will be 4 cents on 100 dollars assessed valuation of property; that is, each tax-payer will pay forty cents on each one thousand dollars of property valuation during the five-year period. It is estimated that it will take at least ten years to complete the new building, and that the contemplated rate of taxation will in said period raise a fund of about \$2,500,000; sufficient to erect an up-to-date modern structure—one that will be a credit to the state and the pride of all Missourians. Vote Yes.

FORSYTH GETS THE COLLEGE

Everybody Pleased and Happy—Preliminary Work to Begin at Once.

At the meeting of the synod at Cape Girardeau last week it was decided to locate the Presbyterian school at this place. Our first news of the decision was conveyed by a telegram sent by Mr. Hughes, who was our representative at the synod, and upon its receipt everybody congratulated everybody, realizing that Forsyth and Taney county had secured an institution that means more for the advancement of the community in all that goes to make life worth while than anything that has offered in the history of the county. It is understood that the synod contemplates the expenditure of about \$10,000 in the beginning, and that a man will be on the ground within a few days to set things in motion.

And now it behooves us to do our part according to promise, and to omit no opportunity of letting "outside barbarians" know that here on the sunny slope of the Ozarks, in the midst of nature's choicest beauties of forest and stream and mountain, one may find health, enjoyment and the higher education combined, assured that all we may be able to do for the institution will be returned to us in many fold and in many ways. Let us not fail to let it be known on all possible occasions that Forsyth is a college town, with more than the customary advantages of a college town lavishly provided by Mother Nature, and we will see an influx of desirable citizens and desirable institutions, to the good and gain of all concerned.

Forsyth will be a college town, and one of the most desirable places of residence in all the southwest. Now let us redouble our efforts to influence the location of desirable citizens, and we can do so with better chances for success in our favor than ever before. We are glad, not because Branson failed to get the college, but because we succeeded. There is no gloating in our gladness, and no students will be more cordially received than those who may enroll from the first railroad town in the county.

Iowa and Georgia—a Comparison.
Out of the eleven Georgia representatives in the house, ten were elected without opposition and the other one had an opposition of 800 to his 5,305 votes—not enough to worry him. He had the largest vote polled by any Georgia congressman; and Mr. Livingston, of the fifth district, had the smallest—2,485 out of a population of 211,527. One in eighty-five of the people in his district voted.

Iowa has the same number of districts and approximately the same population. In the fifth district of Iowa Mr. Cousins received 19,516 votes out of 34,522, the total number cast in a population of 190,227. Twenty thousand difference in the population and 17,031 difference in the size of the vote cast by the winning candidate—and Mr. Cousins had the bigger vote and the smaller district.

There is not one district in Georgia where more than four per cent of the population votes. In the seventh district the proportion is 1 to 32; in the sixth, 1 to 42; in the first, 1 to 50; in the second, 1 to 59; in the third and eleventh, 1 to 63; in the fourth, 1 to 64; in the tenth, 1 to 67; in the eighth, 1 to 60; and in the fifth, as has been said, 1 to 85.

In the second and sixth districts of Iowa between one-fourth and one-fifth of the population votes, while the average throughout the state is about one in five. One Georgia Democrat equal to seventeen Iowa Republicans! It sounds like the days when one planter and his two or three hundred slaves equaled some scores of free northern workmen.

What is true of Iowa and Georgia is partially true of Missouri and Georgia.
