Roosevelt and Tariff Revision.

Tariff revisionists, and other free traders, for in the great majority of instances it will be found that those who clamor for tariff revision desire it in the interest of free trade, try to make much of the relation of the tariff to trusts, and succeed in impressing many persons who have given the matter only superficial consideration or none at all, with the idea that in some mysterious way the tariff is responsible for the trusts, in spite of the fact that some of the most oppressive trusts are in commodities which are "free," and that other fact frequently alluded to, that free trade England is probably the most trust-ridden country in the world; There has come under the notice of the Republican no clearer or more conclusive argument on the problem than that contained in Mr. Roosevelt's letter of acceptance, which follows:

The question of tariff revision, speaking broadly, stands wholly apart from the question of dealing with the trusts. No change in tariff duties can have any substantial effect in solving the so-called trust problem. Certain great trusts or great corporations are wholly unaffected by the tariff. Almost all the others that are of any importance have as a matter of fact numbers of smaller American competitors; and of course a change in the tariff which would work injury to the large corporation would work not merely injury, but destruction, to its smaller competitors; and equally of course such a change would mean disaster to all the wage-earners connected with either the large or the small corporations. From the standpoint of those interested in the solution of the trust problem such a change would therefore merely mean that the trust was relieved of the competition of its weaker American competitors and thrown only into competition with foreign competitors; and that the first effort to meet this new competition would be made by cutting down wages, and would therefore be primarily at the cost of labor. In the case of some of our greatest trusts such a change might confer upon them a positive benefit. Speaking broadly, it is evident that the changes in the tariff will affect the trusts for good or for simply as they affect the whole country. The tariff affects trusts only as it affects all other interests. It makes all these interests, large or small, profitable; and its benefits can be taken from the large only under penalty of taking them from the small also.

Texas people accorded President Roosevelt the warmest greeting since the commencement of his recent trip. Texas people know Teddy, and approve of him without regard to party. If he receives a warmer welcome anywhere it will have to be nearer the tropics.

Aprons of Kansas and the Standard Oil trust, Thomas W. Lawson of Boston says: "Slick 'em!" but the indications are that Kansas does not need encouragement in her fight against the oily octopus. She has a grip on the crittler, and the faculty of holding on, if history is to be relied on.

The naval squadrons of Japan and Russia are within striking distance of each other, in the China sea, and an engagement is looked for any hour. The result of such an engagement will form a culminating point in the war, the victory of the Japanese assuring almost immediate peace, and the victory of the Russians placing all Japanese seaports at the mercy of the Russian navy. The eyes of all nations are turned upon the approaching event with tragic interest, because of its tremendous influence upon the further prosecution of the war.

A most remarkable cure of cancer is reported from London, England, by Dr. Gordon, physician to the Devon and Exeter hospital. The patient is a man of 54 years, whose case had been diagnosed by five surgeons besides Dr. Gordon, all pronouncing his disease cancer and recommending an immediate operation. To this the man would not agree, and undertook treatment of his own case at home. Taking a handful of violet leaves he soaked them twenty-four hours in water, drank a portion of the liquid and used the rest in making hot fomentations, which he applied continuously outside the neck, sometimes keeping the poultices on all night. In three months the change was extraordinary, and the man considers himself cured. Dr. Gordon says he considers the man absolutely honorable. Cancer is one of the most dreaded afflictions to which humanity is subject, and the discovery of a safe and simple cure would be hailed as one of the greatest discoveries of the age.

A Practical Protectionist.

Mrs. Roosevelt's action in wearing an inaugural gown of domestic fabric and make, while not a new or original idea, is no less commendable. It is the most practical and efficient sort of protection to home labor and industry that can possibly be given. As Uncle Sam said of the president, to quote Davenport's famous campaign cartoon: "He's good enough for me." So Mrs. Roosevelt said of American silk: "It's good enough for me." And what is good enough for our president's wife is good enough for any lady in the land. We can make ourselves the \$67,000,000 worth of silk goods we imported last year and give a large portion of that amount in wages to our own people. In this way all of us from the highest to the humblest can be tariff revisionists without injury to any industry, but, on the contrary, giving benefit to all concerned. That is and always has been and always will be the most practical kind of protection, and the most efficient and substantial kind of patriotic Americanism.—American Economist.
