NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION
Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held on Saturday, November 20th, 1914, at the voting precincts of Forsyth and Swan in Taney county, Missouri, for the purpose of determining by the vote of the people residing within the proposed special road district, to be known as Forsyth special road district, the adoption of Article 6, Chapter 10 of R. S. 1892, as amended for by Statutes and taxpayers of said proposed special road district, which said special road district is bounded as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the line between the counties of Taney and Christian, in the state of Missouri, where the range line between ranges 20 and 21 intersects with said county line, thence south along said range line to White river, thence down and along White river to its intersection with the north line of section 7, Twp. 23, range 20, thence west along said section line to the range line between ranges 20 and 21, thence south along said range line to southwest corner of section 18, Twp. 23, range 20, thence east on section line between ranges 20 and 21, and 22, 14 and 23 to White river, thence down and along said White river to a point where the range line between ranges 19 and 20 crosses said river, thence north on said range line to the county line between the counties of Taney and Christian aforesaid, thence west along said county line to place of beginning.

Those favoring the formation of said proposed special road district will vote "For the Adoption of the Road Law," and those opposed to the formation of said road district will vote "Against the Adoption of the Road Law."
