Contract Let For New Bridge

In accordance with the advertised program of the commissioners of the Forsyth special road district, bids were received up to noon Monday of this week for the erection of a steel bridge across Swan creek near Swan post office.

Commissioners Groom, Ford and Berger met at the office of the county clerk with the county court and opened the bids presented and awarded the contract to the Canton Bridge Co for sum of \$4,618. The Canton company was represented here by Fred Marsh II and Mr. Appleby. Bids were also made by the East St. Louis Bridge Co. and the Midland Bridge Co., of Kansas City.

We understand that work is to be started on the new bridge as soon as weather condition permit it.

Fine Cattle
