Edgar Day, aged 33 years, of 709 South Fort Street, was found dead with a bullet hole through his temple at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in a room on the third floor of the Ullman hotel on College street. The young man is believed to have committed suicide. Attaches of the hotel heard a shot about 11:30 o'clock this morning, but an investigation was not made until shortly before the body was found this afternoon. No note was found and no reason is known for the act.

The youth was awakened at 8 o'clock this morning by his mother. Going to town he obtained a room about 10 o'clock at the hotel. The body was found on the floor with the revolver nearby. A mirror had been placed in such a position that it is believed he looked into it when the shot was fired. The body was removed to the Lohmeyer Undertaking parlors.—Springfield Leader.
