Attempt Stamped by Big Army Predictions

Once more, the talk is being advanced in administration circles that because of the stand of the Senate in favor of the Lodge reservations and because the unreserved league covenant has failed of acceptance, the United States will have to organize a vast army and provide a navy second to none.

The obvious purpose of this is to try to create public sentiment in behalf of Mr. Wilson's effort to force the Senate to swallow the treaty and covenant unchanged. However, it is not the first time such tactics have been tried and they will fail again as they failed at first.

Congress has no intention of permitting the administration to drive it into vast authorization for a half million standing army and a navy larger than needed.

The Senate will not be stampeded into accepting the unchanged treaty and covenant and congress will not be frightened into excessive appropriation for preparedness, though willing to provide for preparedness in reasonable measure.

Pershing, Wood and other able officers squarely opposed a standing army of such size. It became clear congress would not provide for it.

General March, preparing a report before the treaty and covenant failed of ratification, used in that report which was widely interpreted as meaning he favored a standing army of a minimum of 260,000.

Now, however General March comes to the front and insists on the 500,000 standing army. He insists his views as given in his report were misinterpreted.

But whether the chief of staff was misinterpreted or not the administration cannot successfully make use of the bogey of a half million standing army to affect the treaty situation. So long as there is no real sign of war, congress is firm in its purpose to hold the standing army down to sane and rational figures.

It will hardly be overlooked, in the administration effort to make it appear that the country must have vast armaments because of the senate's insistence on the Lodge reservations, that the administration has sought to commit this government to a mandat of Armenia and Turkey, or part of Turkey, which would require hundreds of thousands of troops.

A Notable Dinner

War Department Auto Scandal

Representative C. Frank Reavis of Nebraska has been conducting an investigation of the disposition of surplus motor vehicles by the War Department. He discovered that since the signing of the armistice 70,130 automobiles were bought and paid for by the Government.

Many of these were shipped to France during the time our army was being rapidly demobilized and sent home, there to be eventually sold to the French government at twenty cents on the dollar. Other thousands were sent to Camp Holabird, Maryland, about fifty miles from Washington, there to remain in their original crates subject to steady deterioration from the weather.

Beginning in February of this year the Chief of the motor transport corps sent 470 communications to the director of sales declaring the cars at Camp Holabird and other camps to be unserviceable or surplus, and authorizing their sale. For many months absolutely no steps were taken by the sales department to dispose of any of those machines, and it has only been very recently that continued spurring from a republican congress has succeeded in getting action in that direction.

According to Mr. Reavis, much of the delay was due to the fact that representatives of some of the large automobile companies were employed by

the War Department to attend to the disposition of the cars. The man in charge of the sales was formerly manager for the Willys-Overland company in New York City. Congressman Reavis is convinced that consideration for the business of his own and other automobile companies had their effect in holding down the market the surplus government cars. Mr. Reavis's remarks so impressed his colleagues that he secured the passage of a resolution thru the house requesting the Secretary of War to offer for immediate sale at public auction all motor vehicles that may hereafter be declared surplus.
