P. A. Bennett of Buffalo in Race for State Senator



In the announcement column of the Republican this week will be found the name of Phil A. Bennett, of Buffalo, as a candidate for State Senator from this, the 19th District, subject to the action of the Republican voters at the primary, August 3, 1920.

We quote the following from the Marshfield Mail:

"There is no man whom we feel that we could give a higher recommendation to the voters of the 19th Senatorial District and especially Webster County, than Phil A. Bennett.

We have known him for several years and know him to be a clean, conscientious Christian man. One who has set a high standard for clean moral living and who has not been afraid to speak out at all times for the uplift of his community, state and nation.

He has edited the Buffalo Reflex for about 16 years and his columns have always been used for the elevation of mankind, the preaching of true democracy and the teaching of loyal Americanism.

He was born and reared on a farm in Dallas county and is about 39 years old. He taught school two years, is a graduate of the Springfield Business College, and prior to entering the newspaper business did stenographic work.

He has been county chairman of the Republican committee of Dallas county for eight years, Congressional Chairman of the 16th District two years, State Committeeman two years.

This is Mr. Bennett's first candidacy for any office. He has been unanimously endorsed by his home folks, the following resolutions having been passed in his favor several weeks ago:

For School all the Year Around

Columbia, Mo., March 29.—The old-fashioned summer vacation for higher educational institutions will go into the discard some of these days if the system now proving successful at the University of Missouri is generally adopted. According to the announcement of the spring summer term at the University, just issued the three term—or full year—system, adopted as a war measure, has proved so successful that it is likely to be retained. The three term system is merely an application to education of the principle long familiar in the industrial world, that idle machinery means a loss of money. The old idea of closing down three months in the year or the holding a sparsely attended and wholly inadequate summer session represents inefficient use of the educational machinery. In two terms, called the fall and winter terms, the University gives the equivalent of the old school year. Each has a total of sixteen weeks. Then, in place of the old summer session, the University offers the spring-summer term, also of sixteen weeks and equal in every way to the two other terms of the new scholastic year. Students are allowed to enter at the beginning of this term or in the middle of it—this year on April 24 or June 21—so that those taking either half get the equivalent of the old summer session, and those taking all of it get the equivalent of a regular term. As the summer enrollment always contains many teachers, special courses are offered for their benefit, in addition to the regular courses. Many of the regular students in the University remain over for the first part of the spring-summer term and thereby finish school in three years. Many inquiries are coming into the registrar for information regarding the term.

HITCHCOCK FOR WOOD

Former Postmaster General Will Join Forces in Presidential Race.

New York.—Frank H. Hitchcock, former postmaster general and manager of the Taft and Hughes campaigns, has been added to the campaign managers for Leonard Wood.

The acquisition of Hitchcock is considered a splendid political coup because of the fact that he is known throughout the country as a successful presidential candidate booster, and that for the last three terms the man he has declared to be holder of the most of the people's faith has been nominated. Hitchcock probably will work in the East under the direction of William Cooper Procter, national chairman, in Chicago headquarters.

PINCHOT TELLS THEM!

Theodore Roosevelt's Friend Makes Strong Answer to Wood's Defamers.

Brookings, S. D.—"If the American people want a man in the White House who knows and hates militarism, who is hated by every militaristic soldier in America and has suffered vitally from their opposition and jealousy, who was loved by the soldiers he trained because he was human, who was hated by the military clique for the same reason—let them take Leonard Wood."

Six hundred persons at a Leonard Wood mass meeting here heard Gifford Pinchot, chief of the forestry service under Theodore Roosevelt, make this statement and cheered him for several minutes.

DEMOCRATS IN SOUTH SWITCHING TO WOOD

New York.—Confirmation of the report that southern Democrats, especially those in Texas and Louisiana, are steadily drifting away from the organization in the interests of Leonard Wood, was brought to Wood headquarters here by a southern politician. There is a similar trend of Democratic supporters in Kentucky and North Carolina, where it is said that the Republicans have better than an even chance to win.

BAY STATE STRONG FOR LEONARD WOOD

Boston, Mass.—Massachusetts is solidly for Leonard Wood for the Republican presidential nomination, according to Norman J. Gould, eastern manager of the Wood campaign. "With the positive withdrawal of Governor Coolidge from the presidential race," said Congressman Gould, "all sentiment in the Bay state has turned to Wood."

NEW MEXICO WOOD STATE

Santa Fe, N. M.—New Mexico was added to the growing list of Leonard Wood states when a poll of the Republican state central committee on a resolution endorsing Wood for the Republican nomination showed 23 for and only 4 against. The state convention for the selection of delegates will be held here March 20.

ARIZONA DELEGATES PLEDGED TO WOOD

Tucson, Ariz.—Six delegates pledged to Leonard Wood by the unit rule, were selected at the state convention here and in addition the convention passed a resolution endorsing the candidacy of Wood, according to Allan B. Jaynes, Republican national committeeman from Arizona.

WOOD PEOPLES' CHOICE

Boston, Mass.—In announcing his candidacy as a delegate-at-large to the Republican national convention, Lieutenant Governor Louis A. Frothingham of Massachusetts announced that he is pledged to support Leonard Wood for the nomination.

LOUISIANA SELECTS 12 WOOD DELEGATES

New Orleans, La.—Reports of the growing Wood strength in the South were borne out here when twelve delegates, believed of Wood sentiment, were selected to represent Louisiana at the Republican national convention.

WOOD WINS IN N. H.

Concord, N. H., March.—The Presidential primary in New Hampshire resulted in the choice of eight delegates to the Republican convention pledged to Leonard Wood. The delegates pledged to support General Wood are Gov. John Bartlett, Maj. Frank Knox, Fred W. Estabrook and C. Gate Shedd.

WOOD TO ABIDE BY HAYS' LEADERSHIP

WILLIAM PROCTER AND CHIEFS ARE WELL PLEASED WITH RESULTS OF PAST WEEK.

Chicago, March.—An overwhelming sentiment for Leonard Wood's candidacy has developed in the past week, according to William C. Procter, chairman of the Leonard Wood national campaign committee.

Mr. Procter's statement followed a long conference with General Wood, Frank Hitchcock, J. J. McGraw, Fred Stunley, Frederick A. Joss, N. B. Walpole, and others actively interested in the Wood campaign.

"It is of particular gratification to all of us that Mr. Hitchcock has joined our committee," Mr. Procter said. "I want to take this occasion to deny vigorously the rumors which have been put into circulation, to the effect that anyone connected with the Wood campaign will attempt to unseat Will Hays as chairman of the national committee after a presidential candidate is chosen by the Republican party. Every staunch Republican knows that the party has made great progress under the very able leadership of Mr. Hays and General Wood will trust his interests in his capable hands when he is nominated."

WOOD GAINS IN S. D.

Mitchell, S. D., March.—W. H. King, director of the Leonard Wood campaign in this state, makes the prediction that Leonard Wood will carry South Dakota by 35,000 to 40,000 votes. Thirty days ago Mr. King made the prediction that Leonard Wood's majority here would only be 25,000. Since then Governor Lowden visited this state and it is generally admitted that his cause has been weakened by his noncommittal talks.

NEGROES OPEN WOOD OFFICES

Chicago, March.—National headquarters for campaign work among colored people have been opened in the Idlewild hotel, East Thirty-third street and South Wabash avenue, Chicago. This is in accordance with the tremendous interest that is being shown in the candidacy of Leonard Wood for the Republican presidential nomination by the negroes of America.

TENNESSEE FOR WOOD

Nashville, Tenn., March.—The prediction that the state delegation from Tennessee at the Chicago convention will vote solidly for Leonard Wood was made by Republican leaders here following the instructing of two delegates from the First congressional district of Tennessee for Leonard Wood.

No Apologies for Being a Soldier

Chicago, March.—When told by a friend that opposition forces in Illinois were making capital of the fact that he is a soldier and in uniform, Leonard Wood declared that he had no apologies to make for the American uniform.

WOOD WILL TOUR OHIO

Chicago, March.—Leonard Wood is planning a state-wide tour of Ohio, Senator Harding's home state, shortly before the primary of April 17. The sentiment for Harding in Ohio is said to be growing less each day and the people are beginning to think that it might be well to pick a president while they are at it instead of merely picking a "native son."

Territory Taken From Spain.

At the close of the war with Spain the American government obtained possession of Porto Rico, Guam and the Philippines, agreeing to pay Spain \$20,000,000 and give Spanish ships special trading privileges in the Philippines for ten years. Neither statehood nor citizenship was promised to any of the islands taken over and they are governed as territorial possessions.

The crow family is placed by ornithologists at the head of the bird world as being more highly organized than any other.
