On Motion, the Council adjourned.

Ordinance amendatory of Ordinance No. 11, Entitled "an Ordinance in relation to Wharf, Wharfmaster and Wharfage," approved May 29th, 1852.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hannibal, as follows:

Sec. 1. There shall be charged and collected of each and every Steam Boat, running between St. Louis and Keokuk, for each landing, two dollars and fifty cents; and on each Steam Boat, running above the Rapids and landing at this city, one dollar and fifty cents.

Sec. 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances conflicting with this ordinance, is hereby repealed. This ordinance to take effect, and be in force from and after Publication.

An Ordinance Establishing "Coontz" Street.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hannibal, as follows:

Sec. 1st. That "Coontz" street as laid out, extending from Market street to Church street, for the east line thereof commencing on the south side of Market street, say 176 feet of Maple avenue—thence running south one degree west to a stone corner on the north side of Church street, say 320 feet west of Maple avenue—and that the width of said street be thirty-three feet taken off the west side of said line.

The same is hereby established and declared to be a public street, and ordered to be opened and kept in repair as such.

Sec. 2nd. That this ordinance be in force from and after publication.

From the Pittsburgh Dispatch.

HORRIBLE MURDER OF A POLICE OFFICER.
—On Saturday, 16th inst., S. H. Ferguson, constable of the Seventh Ward, accompanied by John F. K. Jones, another officer of the same Ward started to Butte county, with a process from Court, for the arrest of Casper Landpartier, who recently kept a rum-shop in Diamond alley, indicted in our Quarter Sessions for the larceny of gas, by tapping the pipes of the Gas Company, and for keeping a tippling-house.—We learn that, on Thursday, in an endeavor to effect the arrest, Landpartier killed Ferguson with a knife, severely stabbed Jones, and effected his escape.

—We learn, from some persons from the neighborhood, that Landpartier resided six miles from Butler, on the Freeport Road, where the officers arrived on Thursday afternoon, 21st instant, at one o'clock, but did not find him at home. On calling again they found him up stairs, and he expressed a willingness to accompany them, but desired first to change his clothes, refusing to do so, however, in their presence; he went into an adjoining room, procured a dirk-knife and pistol from a stand-drawer, returned and attacked them; Jones knocked the pistol from his hand, with a stick, the only weapon he had, and Mrs. Landpartier endeavored to prevent the murder, but the ruffian succeeded in inflicting seven stabs upon officer Ferguson, and cutting him badly about the right wrist, in his efforts to ward off the blows; he was wounded in the heart, right breast, back, abdomen, and hip, Jones was severely cut in the neck and groin and received other slight wounds.
