She is also an active worker in the National Conference of Jewish Charities and of the National Welfare Conference.

The Chaos in Hungary.

Vienna (By I. J. P. B.)—According to reports in the local papers, a merchant of this city, Baruch Reich, while traveling from Budapest to Komorn, was dragged from the train by officers and soldiers, and murdered. Another Jew, named Singer, was also dragged from the train, and he has disappeared. His body has not been found.

Some time ago, on the same line, two Jewish merchants, named Gross and Muller, were arrested, and since then there has been no trace of them. Their fate is a mystery.
