

inspection by the Commission or any of its duly authorized representatives.

(d) The Commission shall exercise exclusive jurisdiction over all questions arising as to the administration or interpretation of this Order.

This order shall become effective and be in force on and after February 7th, 1921.

Nothing in this order shall prevent any employer from paying more than the minimum or least rate fixed by the commission.

Commissions, bonuses or tips will not be considered part of the wage or salary of females or minors.

The commission may upon sixty days notice, amend, change, rescind or supplement this order, or any part thereof.

THREE AND A HALF MILLIONS CHILDREN STARVING.

Almost 1,000,000 Jewish children in Eastern and Central Europe are in extreme destitution, on the verge of annihilation by starvation and disease unless help comes to them quickly from America, according to the latest reports from American Jewish relief workers abroad.

These 1,000,000 Jewish children will be provided with food and clothing necessities as well as medical supplies for one year, if the American people answer the appeal for \$33,000,000 which the European Relief Council is now making.

With this \$33,000,000 to be raised throughout America by the combined efforts of eight great relief organizations, Herbert Hoover, chairman of the Council estimates that the total destitute, undernourished and diseased ravaged children of Eastern and Central Europe, numbering about 3,500,000 can be saved until the next harvest, when conditions are expected to be such that relief work on such a scale will not be necessary. Mr. Hoover figures that \$23,000,000 is necessary for food and \$10,000,000 for medical supplies and service.

Leaders of the American Jewish Relief Committee throughout the country are active in organizing state and local committees in the great non-sectarian, co-ordinated appeal which will open December 19th and continue

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
