AMARILLO NEWS.

Gus Hollander Dead.

THE NATIONAL FUND IDEA AND THE CHOWEWE ZION.

The Jewish National Fund Commission in Jerusalem has recently organized a number of public meetings. At one of same Dr. Chajim Harari related the following interesting occurrence.

Long before Herzl and Schapira proclaimed the idea of the Jewish National Fund at the first Zionist Congresses, a small band of Chaluzim, who had come to Palestine in the eighties with "work" as their slogan, assembled in Jaffa. It was during the Gholhamoed-Pescash days that these young Jewish pioneers met in Jaffa to go together to Jerusalem. They wanted to celebrate the Pessach festival there in accordance with the Jewish tradition, and during these Pessach days the old and the new Jischub met at the Wall of Wailing in Jerusalem for the first time. The ideals of the young people worked like a charm on the old Jisehub, the speeches which followed being characterized by great enthusiasm and a desire to create.

In the midst of this demonstration, a young workman, whose name is unknown, came suddenly forward and en-

thusiastically proclaimed, for the first time, the idea of the Jewish National treasure, the same idea which was realized later by Herzl and Schapita at the first Zionist Congresses. His speech met with such an enthusiastic reception that it was immediately decided to make a collection, which resulted in Frs. 3000 being obtained, and by no means inconsiderable sum for those times. According to Mr. Harari, this money still lies in the Jerusalem branch of the Credit Lyonnais.

It is to be hoped that it will be possible to procure this money for the Jewish National Fund, as, with thirty-four years' interest it ought to be quite a considerable sum now.

TEN THOUSAND HUNGARIAN JEWS DESIROUS OF GOING TO PALESTINE TO ARRANGE DEMONSTRATION IN FRONT OF BRITISH CONSULATE.

Budapest.—A great demonstration was organized by 10,000 Jews from Budapest and other Hungarian cities, in front of the British consulate in Budapest, demanding a vise of their passports to enable them to proceed to Palestine which they have selected as their future homes.

The movement to emigrate to Palestine has gained a tremendous headway among Hungarian Jews and there are thousands who have registered with the Palestine department of the Zionist organization, not only laborers and people who want to do manual work, but manufacturers, professional and business men as well. Nevertheless, most of the prospective emigrants have no funds wherewith to undertake the journey.

A representative of Hungarian Zionists, Dr. Israel Rappaport, is now in New York endeavoring to interest American capitalists in the movement.
