**Beer Worse Than Whiskey.**

The National Tribune of Washington, journal of the Grand Army of the Republic, in a recent issue denounced beer as a deadly enemy to mankind. Here is the arrangement: The fight to day is for the morals and health of the country against the terrible beer octopus which is undermining the manhood of Germany, destroying its physical fiber and its moral character, and unless checked, will, in the opinion of the best thinking Germans, utterly destroy the country. A battle with whiskey is like a fight with a lion or a tiger—there is something thrilling, exciting, inspiring about it, even tho it ends in the death of its victim. Not so a battle with the remorseless, unshakable, overpowering, slimy

monster beer. It paralyzes, saps, sucks and overpowers its helpless prey.

Where whiskey burns out a man in a year or two, beer simply rots him in every fiber and tissue through a long period of physical and mental deterioration.

Where whiskey may for a time stimulate a man from some weakness or inspire him to some unusual exertion, beer beclouds, deadens, dulls and decays him.

Where whiskey may possibly preserve bodily tissue, beer purifies it.

For the truth of this one need only look around among his acquaintances and see men who have survived whiskey drinking possibly for fifty years, where he cannot find one who has outlived continuous heavy beer drinking a decade. The whole medical fraternity in Great Britain, France, the United States and Germany testify that for the most dangerous patient that can come under their care is one who has been in the habit of drinking considerable quantities of beer. Every one of them will be willing testimony that even under mild attacks of such customary diseases as pneumonia and fever their patients at the moment when any other man would begin to recover slip thro' their hands with the suddenness and completeness of blowing on a candle. Large limbed, full bodied, apparently robust men who have been drinking beer will sink under a light attack of disease that a child should have easily survived.

There is a scientific reason why beer is more deadly than whiskey. The process of fermentation is far from being understood by scientists. Fermentation is the beginning of a process of decay. In this process there are many noxious alkaloids acids and other dangerous substances formed which may exist only temporarily and then be again disintegrated. In fermentation there may go on as a process akin to that which forms the deadly poisons in putrifying meat. When the fermenting, rotting mass is distilled these dangerous bodies are left behind, while the less harmful alcohol is distilled off.

There must necessarily be something of this kind to explain why beer produces so much more degradation of the bodily tissues both of men and animal than does alcohol in the shape of whiskey. No one can deny this who studies even causally the general appearance of a beer drinker and contrasts it with that of a whiskey drinker. Every educated physician will unhesitatingly testify to it. The Germans have the reputation of being the most scientific people in the world and of studying these abstruse problems with more zeal, industry and thoroughness than any other in the world. Today every scientific man in Germany is engaged in an active crusade against beer drinking as the sure source of contamination and degradation

of the physical stamina of the German people.

These pregnant facts give burning point to the fear of the enormous increase of beer drinking in this country. In the last twenty years it has actually doubled, tho everybody has supposed that the temperance cause was making great headway. While other business has had its vicissitudes, with production and consumption rising and falling in cycles of years, the beer business shows every year millions of barrels more produced and drunk. Like earth, all seasons of the year are alike to it, except that every succeeding twelve months adds millions more to its slaves and victims. Even the ravages of disease cannot check it. Though beer drinkers die off like rotten flocks, the number swells every year from the vice drawing victims into its clutch. —Wisconsin Christian Advocate.
