## MAY PROMOTE ELECTRIC LINE.

President Merrifield to Become Active in Business.

Since the resignation of President Merrifield of the state university it is understood that the step has been contemplated for some time and that he intends to become an active business man, after spending nearly a quarter of a century as the head of the state institution at Grand Forks. President Merrifield promoted the electric line from the city to the university and is said to have seen the possibilities of a street railway line in Grand Forks and East Grand Forks. There is an unconfirmed rumor that he has interested capitalists in the proposition and that he will head an organization which will construct an up-to-date system here. It is also claimed that the building of a local line will mean its extension to Crookston and to Mapleton on the Minnesota side. It is only twenty miles to Crookston and Maple Lake is the summer resort for the people of the city. It is understood that the action of the legislature on the mill tax has not influenced President Merrifield's action in any way.

Three of the young men were students at the Moscow university.
