
**The Little Hands.**

The cold, raw weather of early spring always has a bad effect on the children's hands. Parents should see that the little folks are taught to properly dry them when washed, and they should be told the reason for such requirement. If the hands and wrists and face should chap and roughen, it should be explained to the little ones that such a condition generally resulted from hurried wiping, or the use of strong alkaline soaps, and they should be taught how it may be avoided. Children understand many things very early, if they are properly talked to. If they ask you the "why," just give them the reason. See that they wash the hands and face properly, and if soap is used, show them how to "kill" the alkali with a wetting with vinegar. Keep a bit of camphorated muton tallow on the wash stand, and insist on its use at night, seeing that the grease is well rubbed into the skin before they lie down. Teach them to keep the nails clean and shapely; teach them to take pride in such care. Encourage a love of refinement and beauty in your child. If none exists, develop one.

There is renewed agitation in the lignite section of North Dakota for the establishment of briquetting plants. This enterprise is in the same class as tow mills and sugar beet factories. It sounds good in theory but its practicability has not been demonstrated. The chief difficulty up to the present time is in the discovery of a cheap binder. Several processes have been discussed, many of them successful, but their cost has been too great for practical purposes. At the present stage of development the briquetting process is a good means for promoters to separate some easy marks from their bank accounts.—Fargo Forum.
