Big Boom in Western N. D.

SENATOR HANNA TELLS OF HIS OBSERVATIONS IN THE GOLDEN VALLEY COUNTRY AT BEACH

There is a big boom on in the extreme western part of North Dakota and the country is filling with settlers at a rapid rate according to L. B. Hanna who returned yesterday from Beach, where he spent several days during the last week.

"The towns all through that section are full of people. Every train which arrives brings crowds of people who have come to settle on the country, so that it is hard to get a place to stay over night in the towns."

Mr. Hanna states that the settlers who are arriving in such large numbers are an excellent class of people, most of them experienced and practical farmers, from southern Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Indiana, who have come to establish their homes in the new country.

"They have been seeding for more than a week out in that country," continued Mr. Hanna, "and breaking has been going on for a much larger period. There is a great influx of settlers there and the country is settling up fast and seems destined to be very prosperous."

"When I went out there I was a little skeptical regarding the kind of country I would find, but I was very favorably surprised. Our party went over and carefully examined about fifteen sections and we found the soil in the country of Beach to be excellent for farming. There is no gravel or sand and the soil is rich. The only question in my mind regarding the rainfall and they have had enough of that during the past few years to produce fine crops."

"Steam plows are being extensively used out there for breaking purposes." Accompanying Mr. Hanna on his trip were H. H. Wheelock and C. L. Campbell of Fargo, Dr. Davis of Minneapolis, and C. F. Meyers of Eric.—Forum.

Dickinson Press: Alex Streed, a cowboy was arrested Monday by chief of Police Corbett. Streed has been in the city for a few days and had things, seemingly, all his own way in regard to his own conduct and the treatment of his horse, a fine looking animal. After making himself obnoxious to a number of citizens he was "cut out" by the chief of police and rounded up before Judge van der Lass, who branded him as a habitual disturber of the peace and fined him \$50 with costs, for the third offense. The horse fared better in the case and instead of being sentenced to an indefinite period of harsh treatment under a severe master, the animal was sold to satisfy the court and to furnish the wherewithal to secure the release of its former owner.

J. C. Quinlan returned from the east this week and says that the interest among people looking for investments is turned almost entirely upon the prairies of North Dakota. "Without exception," said Mr. Quinlan, "I found that the stories of bad weather and suffering in this country had been so grossly exaggerated that no credit was given them. The people in the cities want homes where they can be free and get away from the sound of the whistle which means hours of drudgery daily and that this freedom is waiting for them in western North Dakota is the growing impression throughout the east. The rush hasn't started yet and the next few years will find it larger than the most sanguine have dared to predict. Of course the majority who are taking land in this section are trained farmers but there is another class that will come and be taught to farm or raise stock and in the end they will make up the majority of our population."—Post.

Kiedrowski; Board of Conciliation, E. L. Holven, J. D. Halstead, C. V. Knox and B. F. Livermore. Nominations for road district overseers left to the voters of the respective road districts to name at the election, next Saturday. Election Board named as follows: Judges, G. W. Richardson and M. Laughnan; Clerks, C. Kidder and A. L. Arnold; Inspector, B. F. Livermore.

- 1st Adjust your cream separator so that the cream will test between 35 and 40% butterfat.
- 2nd Wash the separator thoroughly every time it is used.
- 3rd Skim your milk twice a day while it is fresh and warm, and then cool the cream thoroughly before mixing with the older cream.
- 4th Before starting to fill your delivery can, see that it is thoroughly scalded and perfectly sweet and clean.
- 5th Keep the cream as cold as possible without freezing, in a place free from odors such as emanate from the barn, kitchen or cellar.
- 6th Ship and deliver at least twice in winter and three times per week in summer.
