## BEACH LOSES TO WIBAUX IN A CLOSE GAME.

Wibaux Turned the Tables on the Beach Ball Boys and Got Away With Last Sunday's Game By Score of 4 to 5

The return game with Wibaux which was advertised to take place Sunday, May 26th, was postponed until Sunday, June 2nd, when the Golden Valley boys went over to our neighboring town in Montana and allowed the Wibauxites to steal the game from them.

Although our boys lost the game the exhibition was the best seen in this neck-of-the-woods for many a day and was exciting all the way from start to finish. The Wibaux boys had a change in the line-up and threw a big surprise into the visitors by putting up a fine exhibition of the national game. The local team saw from the start that they had a game on their hands but expected all along to bat out a victory in the latter part of the game and go home rejoicing. But the Wibaux slab artist had it figured differently and whenever he got in a tight place he struck out the opposing batsmen in big league form.

In the second inning the Montanians, with the assistance of a few errors by our team, made two runs and followed up with one each in the next three innings, giving them a total of five runs which the grain growers could not overcome. Not until the eighth round did a local boy reach home; with three men on bases "Smithy" drove out a dandy three-sacker and it looked for a minute as if Beach was going to start something. But it only looked that way for a minute and the side was retired without further damage. Two safe hits in the ninth gave the home boys one more tally and a total of only four—not enough. Nuff said. It is the first victory that Wibaux ever scored over Beach in the history of baseball.

Beach and Wibaux will furnish the baseball program at Wibaux on the Glorious Fourth. There will be a good purse hung up.

On the 6th of this month the local team will go to Dickinson and cross bats with that aggregation.

"Tuck" made a fine catch of a line drive at short and Near made several good assists at second in throwing out runners at first.

Don't forget the baseball dance June 14th at the Beach hall. Good music has been secured. If you go you will be treating yourself to a good time as well as giving the boys a boost financially.

The reason the boys lost was their inability to connect with Chopman's slants. Only one hit was made off him up to the eighth inning and only six hits in all.

Rex Chappel made a difficult catch in center field for Wibaux and incidentally showed the fans that he is a ball player. John Bowler also did fine work for Wibaux in left field.

In the last inning Beach had a good show of winning but could not make good. With one out, Lawrence singled and Brinton hit a three bagger scoring him, but the next two men fanned.

The following is the Beach line-up: Green, catcher; Smith, pitcher and shortstop; Borth, first base; Near, second base; Bowler, shortstop and pitcher; Lawrence, third base; Moulton, right field; Emerson, centerfield; Brinton, left field.

In the second inning Frank Borth was charged with an error which should have been charged against the umpire. After catching a thrown ball Frank intentionally dropped the ball to the ground after holding it several seconds and the umpire called the runner safe. This was the cause of one run for Wibaux.

**Temperance Com. No More.**

The supreme court handed down a decision at Bismarck Wednesday that the law creating a temperance commissioner is unconstitutional. The decision was written by Judge Fisk and concurred in by Judge Morgan, Judge Spaulding dissenting; Temperance Commissioner Murray immediately made preparations to return to Sherbrooke to resume the practice of law.

4th Before starting to fill your delivery can, see that it is thoroughly scalded and perfectly sweet and clean.

5th Keep the cream as cold as possible without freezing, in a place free from odors such as emanate from the barn, kitchen or cellar.

6th Ship and deliver at least twice in winter and three times per week in summer.
