Erickson that were ten inches high. Everything is growing fast.

As the routine of the work is becoming more and more systematized to accomplish the best results the quantity of butter made is being increased, and if possible the quality improved. Few Bismarckers realize what an establishment the creamery and cold storage plant is getting to be and it will pay those interested to visit the creamery and see what a splendid industry it is.—Forum.

Finest Potato Growing Country.

That Golden Valley is a good place for the man with small means cannot be denied, when you take in consideration the abundant yield of everything the soil produces. Take the potato crop alone and figure what profits were realized last year. The average yield per acre was 200 bushels, of the finest of potatoes, which brought from 60 cents to \$1 per bushel. The soil required no cultivating to speak of and the only labor was the breaking of the sod and dropping the potatoes in the furrows. Where can a man realize better profits off an acre of land? Not only potatoes grow here but everything in the way of vegetables and grain that will grow in any northern country. Land is also advancing in value. Land that was bought for \$4 per acre four years ago, sold this week for \$35 per acre with but little improvements made on it, and yet, every day some one will remark that this country is alright for the man with money, but not the poor man.

Writes His Editor Friend in Wis.

A letter from R. P. Rainey of Beach, N. D., was received at this office this week conveying the information that everything looks lively out there. Crops are looking fine with a much larger acreage than last year. He says that 24 steam plows, hauling from 8 to 10 plows, have been plowing in Beach vicinity all spring. He has 50 acres of oats and 140 acres of flax seeded, besides plowing about 300 acres with horses. Jim Pringle has 20 acres of flax in on his homestead. Land has advanced about \$10 per acre this spring. Mr. Rainey says that Beach vicinity is an ideal spot for a farmer of small means, but it seems that a good many farmers of large means are locating there.—Arcadia (Wis.) Arcadian.
