STODDARD GIVES A BIG DANCE.

One of the largest dances ever known of in Billings county was given by Commissioner J. B. Stoddard at his ranch last Friday evening. Mr. Stoddard employed the Beach orchestra and threw open the doors of his new barn which is 40x90 with a 16 foot shed lean-to on each side, and about two hundred people assembled, coming from Dickinson, Medora, Sentinel Butte, Beach, Burkey, Wibaux and Carlyle. The floor in the second story of the barn is laid of 3 inch fir no. 1 grade, which made a very fine dancing floor. All guests coming with teams were pleasantly surprised to find that arrangements had been made to have all teams fed and stabled. Refreshments were served at midnight, after which Rep. A. L. Martin extended thanks in behalf of the happy crowd to Mr. Stoddard for his courteous treatment which was tendered at quite an enormous expense. Mr. Stoddard has a flock of over 15,000 sheep, several hundred cattle and horses, employs about twenty men and, in fact, has one of the largest and best improved ranches west of the Missouri River.
