(Continued from page one) depth of about eighteen inches. With the superior soil of the Golden Valley we are safe should it not rain for another month, and it is safe to say we could stand a six weeks' drouth without and material detriment.

With the exception of some flax and corn the farmers of this district are practically through seeding and ninety per cent of the crop is peeping through the ground, most of the wheat four and five inches high.

Since the influx of Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa farmers into the Golden Valley it has been discovered that corn can be successfully grown here and this year the farmers have gone to the raising of this particular cereal quite extensively. In another year diversified farming will be a common thing in this district.


Prizes amounting to \$100 will be offered for the best trimmed autos and floats.
