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THEY ARE GETTING WISE.

The following editorial taken from the Minot Democrat very patently exemplifies the change of heart throughout the state of North Dakota with reference to the Equity movement, and reiterates an incident which was mentioned by Mr. Greeley in his speech to a large number of farmers who were in attendance at the farmers' meeting held in the Beach opera house a short time ago.

Word comes from New Rockford. Yes, New Rockford, North Dakota, the same town that closed up all its halls some months ago when the farmers wanted to hold an Equity meeting with George S. Loftus as speaker, that the citizens there have changed their opinion about whether farmers should be permitted to hold meetings for the purpose of organization, for these same citizens recently addressed a very polite invitation to Mr. Loftus for him to appear there and continue with the adjourned Equity meeting. GEORGIA'S DISGRACE.

The case of Lei Frank, from first to last, has been disgraceful thing for the state of Georgia. The man was convicted on evidence of the most flimsy kind. Public sentiment had been permitted to express itself in such a manner that the atmosphere thus created could not fail to have an influence on the verdict. When sufficient time had elapsed to permit passion to cool, and the case to be considered on its merits, despite the character of the evidence and the conditions surrounding the trial, the public vociferously demanded its feast of blood. The governor who undertook to investigate the case fairly was threatened with everything from political ruin to violent death. Governor Slaton—all honor to him for it—had the courage to do what he was convinced was right, and to accept whatever consequences might follow. Now the drama is ended by the murder of Frank by a mob who took him from the hands of the state and put him to death.

With popular feeling as it is in the adjacent territory it is almost absurd to suppose that anyone will ever be punished for this latest crime. There has been too much evidence that such an act would be popular, and it may be expected that the men who committed it will go their ways unmolested, with their participation in the crime a matter of common knowledge.

The case long ago passed the individual stage. The murder of the poor girl who was done to death in the factory was a brutal and horrible thing. Frank himself, an innocent man so far as any conclusive evidence shows, was another victim whose case merits deep sympathy. But the whole affair has clouded the reputation of a great state, and it must have a destructive influence on the moral fiber of its people.—Grand Forks Herald.


