The farmers of this nation to come into their own must study business. We must, as a class, understand the fundamental principles that underlie every industry...

The first and most familiar function of a bank is that of gathering up the idle money of a community, small sums and large, and thus forming a pool or reservoir upon which responsible persons may draw as they have temporary use for money.

If there were but one bank in a community and everybody paid all bills by drawing checks on that bank, and everyone receiving a check immediately deposited it in the bank...

A bank is constantly receiving from its customers, particularly those that are shipping products to other localities, drafts and checks drawn on banks in other cities...

Russians on Move Against Teutons

Serbian Troops Demoralized.—Guerrilla Warfare Now Resorted to.—Bulgarians Going Forward.

London, Nov. 28.—Serbian forces soon will become an army without a country, unless the French should defeat the Bulgarians, four divisions of whom are said to be hampering at the French lines.

The main Serbian army, retreating in a southwesterly direction before Field Marshal von Mackensen's troops, may find no rest even in Greek territory, as it is reported here that the invaders of Serbia would not hesitate to cross into Greece.

Victory Near Bagdad.

Additional reports from the battle of Stesiphon, in Mesopotamia, near Bagdad, indicate that the British forces won a substantial success instead of suffering a reverse, as first accounts led everyone to believe.

The diplomatic representatives at Athens of the entente powers are still active. Their latest effort to settle definitely all outstanding questions being the presentation of Premier Skouloudis of a note detailing measures deemed indispensable for the security and freedom of action of the allied troops.

Russia Gathering Forces.

The situation along the Rumanian frontier, where a great Russian force is said to have been gathered, is still obscure. The display by the Rumanian public of feeling in favor of the entente is regarded in London as an indication that the nation is in a position to disregard the demands of the central powers.

No definite news has been received of the renewed Austro-German offensive in Galicia. It is expected, however, that this movement will be pushed energetically for the political effect on Rumania.
