**20 HORSES IN RUNAWAY MIXUP NEAR CRYSTAL**

**Two Animals Killed While Men Escape Injury.**

Crystal, N. D., June 28.—As Robert Chambers was driving along the road his team became frightened and ran away. Chambers was thrown out. The horse ran straight for a grader outfit to which sixteen horses were being worked.

The end of one of the thills of the cart penetrated the side of one of A. R. Baker's driving horses, which was working at the rear end of the grader, killing the animal on the spot. In the mix-up Clyde Beaver was caught and taken under the grader.

The runaway horse freed itself from this mixup and headed for R. Spotwood's four-horse-team which was working on a disk near by, and caused a mixup there in which one of Mr. Spotwood's horses received a leg broken. After this the horse freed itself from the cart and ran to Gillies, its former home.

The remarkable part is that no one was injured and the runaway horse came out safe.

**Guy Crossman Passes Away**

**After Months of Hopeless Though Patient Suffering from Cancer, Young Man Answers Last Call.**

The community was shocked at learning that Guy Crossman, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Crossman of southeast of Beach, had passed away, death being caused by cancer. A recent visit to the Mayo hospital at Rochester resulted in a diagnosis of cancer, the disease having progressed to such a degree that an operation was inadvisable. Death occurred Monday, after months of patient suffering. Mr. Crossman prior to his death, planned all the details of his funeral, asking that Rev. Keniston preach the sermon and that the Beach Quartette sing. His wishes were compiled with, funeral services being held at the Congregational church in this city Tuesday morning, Rev. Keniston was assisted by Rev. Mercer. The Beach Quartette rendered several beautiful numbers. Interment was made in the Beach cemetery.

Though unexpected, Guy's death was none the less shock to his many friends. He was an excellent young man, highly thought of in Beach and his own community.

James Guy Crossman was born at Elkton, S. D., April 20, 1885. In May 1912, he was married to Mary Brunt Arnold of Lima, Ohio. In the spring of 1906 they came to their homestead about 20 miles southeast of Beach, where they have since made their home. H. P. Crossman and wife, parents of the deceased, living 17 miles southeast, one sister and a brother, Darwin C., of Lima, Ohio, constitute the family. D. C. Crossman came at the call of the parents to be present during the last days.

**Masonic Temple is Now Assured**

**Plans Have Been Completed and Bids are Being Advertised for By Executive Committee.**

Mention was made several weeks ago in the columns of the Chronicle of the proposed new Masonic temple, the feasibility of which was receiving earnest consideration at the hands of the local chapter A. F. & A. M., Sunset Lodge 188. At a recent meeting the committee, composed of Messrs. A. E. Kastein, J. P. Smith and M. Mathison were invested with absolute authority to negotiate for bids and complete the building at a cost of \$8,000. Request for bids are already being advertised by the committee.

The size of the new building will approximate 36x80, and it will be a story and a half in height, with a concrete basement. Construction will begin as soon as the preliminary arrangements have been attended to, and it is thought that the temple may be ready for occupancy by October 1st.

Since receiving its charter from the Grand Lodge about nine years ago, the Beach chapter has grown from a very humble beginning to one of the representative lodges of this part of the state. The first meetings were held in the old mill, which was soon outgrown and more permanent quarters were arranged in the upper story of Kastein's (now Parsons) Machine Shop. For several years past this, also, has afforded ample accommodations to the rapidly growing membership, and steps were taken which have resulted in assuring for Beach the new temple. When completed, it will accommodate the Blue Lodge, the Order of the Eastern Star, and later the Chapter, steps toward the organization of which are now under way. The Blue Lodge now has a membership of a little over one hundred.
