(Continued from Page One.) proposition, one of the main issues in which the Republican and Democratic parties disagree. In discussing it and giving statistics to prove how our exports had fallen off he mentioned the fact that during a period of peace it was necessary, under a Democratic regime, to collect a hundred million dollar war tax.

"Our Foreign Policy" and "Has Wilson kept Us Out of War," were the next subjects upon which he spoke. He said that three years ago the United States demanded and received the respect of every nation of the world and that as the result of the vacillating policies of President Wilson this country was the laughing stock of the world today. He reviewed the Mexican situation quite thoroughly and conclusively proved that at the present time this country did not respect the dignity of its citizenship; in other words that while it is one of the most powerful nations in the world, it affords no protection to its citizens abroad.

Mr. Norton's remarks showed no spirit of malice and were very well received by all who heard him. His arguments were sound and met with the approval of every Republican present. His ecomium to Porter J. McCumber and the worth of that Senator in the Senate did not rest well with the Democrats present as one would imagine, however, as did neither his suggestion to "vote the Republican ticket straight, National, State and County."

The dance given in the Opera House last evening was well attended and all present report a very pleasant time.


