COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA.)

COUNTY OF GOLDEN VALLEY)
The Board of County Commissioners
met pursuant to adjournment at nine
o'clock A. M. December 6, 1916. All
members present.

C. L. Wilkins appeared before the
Board relative to a certain proposed
road in Township 137, range 103. Where-
in a Petition was filed and laid on the
table at previous meeting. After con-
siderable discussion the Board of Co.
commissioners decided to view said
road at a later date.

Twelve o'clock Noon the board ad-
journed to meet at one o'clock P. M.
One o'clock P. M. the board met pur-
suant to adjournment. All members
present.

The Board of county commissioners
made the following award of damages,
for the new road on the following de-
scribed land for the reason that said
highway passing through and the
owners of some of the land being un-
known have assessed damages to each
of the individual claimants through
which such highway passes, as fol-
lows:

The Auditor was instructed to pre-
pare releases on the above property
and forward same for completion be-
fore payment of damages be made.

Moved by Lee, seconded by Curl,
that \$9.91 of the 1916 tax and \$14.81
of the 1917 tax for Stuart Severson be
credited for the reason that the
same was unable to make further
collection on account of the property
being sold. On the above motion all
members voted, Aye.

Moved by Curl, seconded by Lee, that
the petition of George Sonsalla for the
cancellation of \$4.53 personal property
tax for the year 1907 be granted for
the reason that Mr. Sonsalla was as-
sessed twice for the year 1907 and paid
only 1907 tax. On the above motion all
members voted, Aye.

The Petition of O. G. Vaughn for the
cancellation of 1907 personal property
tax for the sum of \$2.25 was presented.
Upon investigation the board found
that the same was a double assessment
for that year, being taxed twice for

the same property. Moved by Lee, sec-
onded by Curl, that the prayer of the
petitioner be granted.

Mr. Svendbye presented the follow-
ing Petition:

To The Honorable Board of County
Commissioners, of Golden Valley
County.

Gentlemen: Hans J. Svendbye of
Sordland Butte, North Dakota, appears
before me and respectfully asks your
Honorable Board that you relieve him
of the unjust burden of paying taxes
on the Northern Pacific Railway Right-
of-way through the S 1-2 and the NE
1-4 of the SE1-4 of section 22, Twp.
140, Range 104, to the end that you de-
duct from the number of acres with
which he is now taxed under the above
description the number of acres con-
tained within the said Right-of-way,
to-wit: 25 acres. And in his behalf I
beg to leave to submit the following
certificate.

I, Thor G. Plomason, Surveyor of
Beach, North Dakota, do hereby certify
that I have made a survey of the
Northern Pacific Railway's Right-of-

way through the S1-2 of the SE1-4 of
section 22, Twp. 140, Range 104, and
that I find the same to be as follows:
to-wit:

The SE1-4 of the SE1-4 section 22-
140-104, 10.17 acres.

The SW1-4 of the SE1-4 section 22-
140, 104 14.83 acres.

In Witness Whereof, I have here-
unto set my hand the day and year
above written.

(Signed) Thor G. Plomason, Surveyor
Moved by Lee, seconded by Curl,
that the prayer of the Petitioner be
granted, and the Auditor authorized to
make a deduction from the present
taxable acreage of Mr. Svendbye's in
section 22, Township 140, Range 104.
On the above motion all members
voted, Aye.

Moved by Lee, seconded by Curl,
that the Auditor notify the Sheriff
that this case will not pay any
further commission for the collection
of personal property tax, after col-
lection made during the month of
November, 1916, and in the Sheriff's
November report that the Treasurer
do not pay commission for the col-
lection of the Howden and Stough
personal tax. The board believe and
are convinced that under the law that
the collection of personal property tax
is part of the duty of the Sheriff to
collect same, when due or delinquent
and when authorized by the county
treasurer. On the above motion all
members voted, Aye.

Moved by Lee, seconded by Curl,
that in the Petition of Alden Mosher,
wherein he recites that this county has
assessed him twice for the year 1915,
or rather assessed him for property
which he claims he did not have, the
Auditor was instructed to notify the
Sheriff to hold the collection of the
Alden Mosher tax \$76.74 until such
time as the board could investigate
fully relative to the merits of the claim
On the above motion all members vot-
ed, Aye.

A communication and personal pa-
pers of Clarence Morgan was received
from Judge Maser of Stark county
stating that Mr. Morgan was taken
at Richardson, North Dakota, on the
7th day of last November, 1916, and
sent to the State Insane Asylum at
Jamestown, after he had been ad-
judged insane by the Insanity board.
Judge Maser in his communication
stated that Mr. Clarence Morgan was a
resident of this county and as such
was a charge against Golden Valley
County. Upon investigation the board
made the following finding: First,
Mr. Morgan came to this county in
October 1915, and remained only for
a short time, going to the State of
Montana and engaged in employment
there, thence returning to Golden Val-
ley remaining a short time, from there
he went to South Dakota, remaining
but a brief period and returning some
time in May, 1916, he resided contin-
uously from that time until the 27th
day of October, 1916, in the employ-
ment of J. B. Stoddard. Second, under
the provisions of section 2501 compiled
laws of 1913, paragraph 4, Morgan did
not reside in this state one year con-
tinuously, in other words he simply
drifted around from place to place.
Third, we find that Clarence Morgan's
home is in the state of Illinois. Moved
by Lee, seconded by Curl, that the Au-
ditor be instructed to notify Judge
Maser of the findings of the Board of
County Commissioners, that the Au-
ditor also notify state Auditor Jor-
nerson of the facts. On the above
motion all members voted, Aye.

lunch restaurant.


"There's no chance for adventure
