Mr. Beveridge, who is spending the summer at Seal Harbor, Me., says the letter is intended as an answer to queries of many Indiana friends who sought to know his position concerning the Progressive party. He says in his letter that if the new party does no more in Indiana than oust the old line political bosses it will have performed a great blessing to the state.

## Quack Grass Menace According to Henry

INSTRUCTOR AT NORMAL ARGUES FOR DESTRUCTION OF PERNICIOUS GRASS.

That the farmers of North Dakota have no weed against which they must contend, that presents so great a menace as quack grass is the statement of Prof. Clarence Henry of the State Normal school. Addressing the students and teachers of the institution this morning Mr. Henry stated that this grass was becoming so great a

nuisance to the state that it now touches every county and seriously hampers the growing of crops. According to Mr. Henry it is well nigh impossible to rid the land of this grass unless it be taken upon its first appearance. He discussed its growth and the fact that its roots are of such a nature that once started they multiply upon cultivation. Unless prompt action is taken Mr. Henry states that it may be necessary later to allow land to lie idle for several years that the quack grass may be destroyed by smothering.

## Holland Machine Is Great Invention

PRES. MCFARLAND SPEAKS OF SEEING CONTRIVANCE IN OPERATION AT FAIR.

That the Wild Oat Separator, invented by Albert Holland of this city, is a great contrivance for the farmer of this state, is the belief of President George A. McFarland of the State Normal School. Mr. McFarland has returned from the State Fair at Fargo and says that a model of the machine is in operation there and that it is receiving favorable comment from all who investigate.

The machine is so constructed that the nature of the wild oat will mean its destruction, the tiny harbs at the bottom of the seed being the means by which they are held to a cloth screen and separated from the tame variety.

Unlike any labor situation ever faced before in North Dakota this is peculiarly acute, because last year the crop losses broke the continuity of employment which in every year for a decade has sent the labor wave through the entire northwest. Last year and some extent in the year before a vast country fell below in labor requirements and the long unremunerative travel stretch across, turned back, at that time thousands of laborers from the winter wheat fields who would have moved north.

This year this territory has the greatest crop it ever raised and efforts have been made to inform the southern laborers of the situation, and that they may come up with the certainty that there will be work for every man.
