

CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZES WHITE WAY AND PLANT IMPROVEMENTS

Large Amount of Machinery Will Be Installed at Once--Shipment of Posts for White Way to be Made at Once.

The transaction of a large amount of important business marked the meeting of the city council Monday evening, and as a result, the White Way for the city will be installed within a few weeks, and improvements for the gas plant amounting to about \$15,000 will be made at once.

The improvements for the gas plant, which is one of Mayor Platon's pet plans, will be begun at once. New machinery will be installed, and a large amount of the equipment which is now in the plant, will be discarded as unfit for service. It is claimed by the mayor, who has investigated the condition of service, as well as by the superintendent of the plant, that a saving will be made in fuel which will pay for the cost of the improvements in a short time.

The amount of lost current is also very large, and this will be cut out to a large extent. About seven thousand dollars worth of copper wire will be disposed after the improvements are

installed, which will help to pay for the new machinery.

Seventy two posts for the White Way were ordered this morning by wire, and will be here as fast as freight can bring them. A slight change in the finish of the posts has been made, giving them what is called a Bronze statuary finish. This, it is claimed, will withstand the attacks of the weather for a minimum of ten years.

To Alderman D. W. Clark belongs the credit for finally swinging the council into line for the new lighting system. For several meetings the council has been divided on the installation, as to whether the cost should be paid by the city or business men. Until Monday evening, Mr. Clark had been in favor of paying for the installation by the business houses, but he voted to have the city pay the cost at the last meeting, and thus swung the proposition through in accordance with the plans of the mayor.

RETURNED TO BERKELEY.


