Plans For New Normal Are Out

LOCAL CONTRACTORS WILL GET CHANCE TO BID ON STATE BUILDING AT MINOT.

Fargo, N. D., Aug. 17.—Plans for the new state Normal school building which will be erected at Minot at a cost of approximately \$200,000 have been received at the Fargo Builders and Traders' exchange. Bids will be asked for the construction of the building and they will be opened and the contract awarded on Aug. 26.

The Normal school will be a three-story structure of brick and the estimated cost is for the building and furnishings complete.

The basement will contain a large gymnasium. On the first floor will be located the auditorium, library and general school offices. The second floor will have laboratories, lecture and recitation rooms and the third floor will contain the society rooms, one for boys and one for girls, with other class rooms.

Other plans received at the Builders and Traders exchange are for an 8-room school house at Steele. The building will cost about \$24,000 and bids are to be opened and the contract awarded on Aug. 22. Mohall, N. D., will build an eight-room school house to cost about \$20,000. Bids for it will be opened August 27, and the contract will be awarded soon after that date.

Construction of Gas Plant Has Begun

PART OF MACHINERY ALREADY SHIPPED—BALANCE TO COME SOON.

Active work on the construction of the main building for the Valley City Gas company, began last week on the site just south of the Northern Seed company's plant, and will be rushed to completion as fast as the workmen can erect the building.

The size of the main building will be 38 feet by 56 feet, and it will conform to the lines and ideas of the most modern plants. The machinery is already on the road, and will be here within a week. The piping for the streets has been shipped from Virginia, and is also expected within a short time. The interior piping is already on the ground, and will be installed as fast as possible.

AN ORDINANCE

Amending an Ordinance Prescribing the Width of Parking and Boulevarding on the Street Side of Sidewalks in the City of Valley City, North Dakota.

Be it Ordained by the City Council:

Section 1. That all roadbeds or streets in the city of Valley City shall be thirty feet wide from curb to curb, except those hereinafter mentioned. The line to be taken from the center of all streets and to extend fifteen feet on either side from said center line. The remainder of the street on either side of the roadbed from the curb line to the property line is hereby set apart for curbing and boulevarding purposes.

Sec. 2. The streets not affected by Section "1" hereof and which shall remain their present width are the following:

All of that portion of Main street from First avenue to the Park Foot Bridge; all of that portion of Front street from Second avenue to Eighth avenue; all of that portion of Second avenue from Third street to Main street; all of that portion of Third avenue from Third street to Main street; all of that portion of Fourth avenue from Third street to Fourth street; all of that portion of Fifth avenue from Third street to Fifth street; all of that portion of Sixth avenue from Front street to Fourth street; all of that portion of Seventh avenue from Front street to Fourth street; all of that portion of Third street from the Sheyenne River on the east to the Sheyenne River on the west of said street, and all of that portion of Fourth street from the alley between Third and Fourth avenues to Sixth avenue.

The following street shall be forty feet wide:

All of that part of Fourth avenue from Fourth street to the city limits on the north; all of that part of Fifth avenue from Fifth street to the city limits on the north; and all of that part of Sixth avenue from Fourth street to the city limits on the north. All that part of Eighth avenue from First street to the city limits on the south, be thirty-eight feet wide and that curbing at present built in front of lots 1, 2, and 3, block 3, Andrus and Siftons Addition to Valley City be and are hereby considered in proper place

and correctly located.

Sec. 3. That all property owners may park from the curb line to the property line and they may have the privilege of planting trees and grass thereon, and that whenever a petition from a majority of the resident property owners between any given points along any street for the purpose of parking or boulevarding said street is filed with the City Auditor, the city council shall thereupon order the curbing to be built and the boulevard made by the property owners within thirty days after the making of such order by the city council. If the property owners refuse or neglect to comply with the said requirements of the city council, the city council shall then place the said curbing as above specified, fill in with dirt and plant the same to grass, and maintain the same for a period of six months. If the property owners refuse to pay the expense incident to the curbing and boulevarding along their property, the city council shall charge said expense against said property as by law in such case is made and provided.

Sec. 4. Any property owners that may curb and boulevard along his property that part of the street set apart by this ordinance for that purpose shall be entitled to the benefit of this ordinance in securing water at the rate provided for in this ordinance from between May 1st and October 1st of each year. But on laying the curbing and making the boulevard, the property owners must comply with the rules and regulations of the city council in relation to the manner of curbing, planting trees and boulevarding. Provided, however, that where ever there are now trees growing between the present street line and the property line, the same shall not be removed nor interfered with, but the city reserves the right to trim any and all trees growing on all boulevards.

Sec. 5. Whenever any property owner has curbed and boulevarded along his property, and the city council by reason of petition or otherwise deem it necessary or expedient to erect new curbing along said property, then the city shall replace said particular property at its own expense.

Sec. 6. Any property owner having boulevarded along his property shall pay only one-half of the usual price for city water between May 1st and October 1st of each year for all water that he uses in excess of the average amount of city water used by him during the previous months from October

1st to May 1st.

Sec. 7. Whenever the owner or occupant of any lots or lot having complied with the requirements of this ordinance, and desiring to get the benefit of the reduced water rates herein provided, shall first notify the city engineer, who shall within three days after receiving such notice inspect the premises reported to him as being improved under this ordinance, and if he finds the ordinance has in all things been complied with, he shall so report to the city auditor in writing. Thereupon the city auditor shall file such report in his office and there after give the benefit of reduced water rates to the owner or occupant of such premises.

Sec. 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.
