PROF. JAMES, ACTING FOR THE COMMERCIAL CLUB, WANTS VARIETY OF DISPLAY.

Prof. M. C. James, superintendent of the Barnes county exhibit at the North Dakota Industrial Exposition to be held in Bismarck, has issued a call for exhibits and displays to be forwarded at once, or register what is to be shown, with him. The exhibit is being collected under the auspices of the Valley City Commercial club, and the call for exhibits reads:

"Barnes county has decided to put up a county exhibit at the Exposition at Bismarck and the committee in charge very much desires co-operation in the matter of containing material for the same. We wish to secure, at once, materials of the best that Barnes county has produced in the way of farm products, such as:

- List of Exhibits.**
- Grains in sheaf or threshed.
 - Sweet corn, popcorn, or field corn in the ear or on stock.
 - Seed and hay of alfalfa.
 - Seed and hay of any of the clovers.
 - Seed of any of the grasses in sheaf.
 - Vegetables of any kind, including potato, pumpkin, squash, etc.
 - Fruits, either canned, dried or fresh such as currants, gooseberries, strawberries, raspberries, plums, apples, compass, cherries, etc.
 - Butter and cheese.

"Any one having any of this material which he is willing to supply will please leave same at F. C. Reidman's farm implement store on Fifth avenue, Valley City. If this is not convenient, send by express C. O. D. to M. C. James; or phone or write the same.

"Any material used in the exhibit will bear the name of the grower. All material must be in the hands of the committee by the 25th of September, the earlier the better.
