## VALLEY CITY MAY HAVE \$150,000 BRICK AND TILE MAKING PLANT

**St. Paul Capitalists Take Samples of Clay From Surrounding Hills for Testing Purposes and May Locate factory Here.**

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The erection of a \$150,000 brick and tile plant in Valley City may be the result of a visit here yesterday by S. L. Davidson, A. R. Robertson, and C. E. Hickman, St. Paul capitalists and manufacturers of Denison Interlocking Tile. Such a plant would employ fifty to sixty men and the payroll would amount to about \$200 a day. As most of the labor about the plant is highly skilled, that class of workmen are usually married, so they, with their families, would mean an increase in population in Valley City of 200 to 300.

These capitalists, looking for an investment along the lines in which they have been successful, were taken to the hills surrounding the city yesterday afternoon by Secretary Otto Zetterberg, of the Commercial club, and shown the deposits of clay and shale. Samples were taken and a chemical test was applied. The clay was found to contain considerable lime but this does not necessarily affect it, in the opinion of Mr. Davidson, head of the party.

### Make Physical Test.

"It is liquid lime," said Mr. Davidson, "and may not affect the clay. However, I do not go much on chemical analysis. The only method to determine the value of clay for the manufacturing purposes is by a physical test of strength. We shall give this clay that sort of test when we make it into blocks at the factory. A physical test is the only way we may learn the actual quality of the clay.

"I firmly believe you have the right kind of clay in these hills surrounding your city. We may not have found it today, and in all probability I shall return here and take a week or so, boring into the hills and making a thorough search for what we want.

### Suitable Clay Here.

"The topography and character of the soil here is almost identical with that surrounding our big plant. It sits in a basin just like Valley City and there are many hills so nearly like these surrounding your city that one could scarcely tell the difference.

None of the factories manufacturing the Denison tile are keeping up with orders. It is the building material of the day and Valley City would be an ideal location for a plant."

The nearest brick manufacturing concern to Valley City is approximately 150 miles, and a local plant would save the big freight rate, a saving to insure more building in this city. The men who were in the city yesterday have the exclusive right in the Northwest for manufacturing the Denison tile block, a hollow triangular affair that fills the space of twenty brick, can be laid more rapidly than brick and costs much less. Thus, Valley City would be the manufacturing center and distributor for this building material that is now such an important feature in business house and residence construction.

### Induced to Come Here.

The party of capitalists were directly induced to come here to look at the clay by City Auditor Boyd. Mr. Boyd is acquainted with Mr. Hickman and was talking with him at the Minnesota state fair in St. Paul last week. The conversation drifted to brick manufacture and Mr. Hickman said he would like to find a new bed of clay. Mr. Boyd told him about the clay beds in the hills surrounding Valley City, and Mr. Hickman was so impressed that he said he would take up the matter with Dr. Davidson. Mr. Davidson had heard of the clay beds here but the conversation led up to prompt action.

### Hunt for Clay.

The Commercial club will likely hold a special meeting to consider what manner of assistance it can give Mr. Davidson and his associates in finding suitable clay for the manufacture of their product and encourage the location of a new \$150,000 industry in this city. One of the propositions will likely be an assignment of a number of members to make a search of the hills surrounding Valley City and have samples of clay ready for Mr. Davidson when he returns and point out the beds from whence they came. This will greatly

facilitate matters and indicate to Mr. Davidson that Valley City bids him welcome and that it will do all an enterprising city can do to help build up the new enterprise.

## Organize Orchestra at the High School

The high school orchestra was organized yesterday evening and regular rehearsals will now begin. There is much interest taken in the orchestra this year and it will be a big musical organization, but there is the usual shortage of brass and reed instruments. On account of no cornet and reed instrument teacher being in Valley City the high school orchestra has been short on those instruments to balance the string side, and the defect will apparently not be remedied this year.

A debating club is being organized and Superintendent Hanna hopes to arrange a three cornered meet with Jamestown and Carrington, in lieu of taking part in the state debating league. Two teams will be organized so that there will be home competition, and the best will be given the opportunity to win the honors.

## How's This Mixture Going To Come Out?

CLAIMANTS OF LAND ON INDIAN RESERVE FACE PROBLEM ON OPENING DAY.

Minot, N. D., Sept. 17.—Over 500 valuable claims in the Berthold Indian reservation will be open to entry Oct. 1, and owing to a confusion in the law, which authorizes the taking of the land by either settlement or entry, some exciting scenes may be enacted.

The law provides that a person may take possession of the land on or after 9 o'clock on the morning of Oct. 1, or he may file at the land office at Minot. The former method is called taking the land by settlement, and the latter by entry. If a person settles on the land and starts improvements, he has ninety days in which to make formal entry. If he settles on the land before another person appears at the land office at Minot to file, he gets the land, but if the person files before the first man makes settlement the one who files first gets it.

**More Complications.**  
But here is the question. If two men move on to the land and are holding it down at 9 o'clock on Oct. 1, who gets the land? The officials at the land office are unable to answer this question. Such a situation would result in litigation, and only the courts would probably settle it. Instances of this kind have occurred before, and in some cases the land has been cut in two parts and each man gets half.

Suppose, in addition to the two men being on the land, a third man appears at the Minot land office and files at 9 a. m., Oct. 1. Who gets the land in this case? This is another conundrum for the land office officials.

Ployhar (to whom the gas franchise was granted by the city) by registered mail, and I hold register receipts from said parties that they received the same, on the 12th day of August, 1912; to-wit:
