

DAIRY NOTES.

Furnished by E. A. Greenwood, Assistant Dairy Commissioner.

In winter time, do not turn cows out to remain and suffer in cold stormy weather. Treat your cows as you would like to be treated yourself.

Allow them to have water which is not colder than a deep well, twice or three times a day. Brush cows daily if you can possibly find time, for it pays better than does grooming of horses, which as a rule is not neglected. Keep cows in clean, well ventilated stables. Be regular in time of feeding and milking. Get your neighbors to share with you in owning a Babcock milk tester, and testing the milk of each individual cow.

Sell to the butcher the cow which has failed at the end of the year to pay market price for all feed she has consumed.

Belong to a dairymen's association, and every organization that will help to keep you posted and in touch with the best up-to-date methods of managing your herd.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the State of North Dakota.

That the constitution of the state of North Dakota be amended to read as follows:

The legislative assembly is hereby authorized and empowered to provide by law for the erection, purchasing or leasing and operation of one or more terminal grain elevators in the states of Minnesota or Wisconsin, or both, to be maintained and operated in such manner as the legislative assembly shall prescribe, and provide for inspection, weighing and grading of all grain received in such elevator or elevators.

That article 9, section 158 of the constitution of the state of North Dakota, is amended so as to read as follows:

Section 158. No land shall be sold for less than the appraised value, and in no case for less than ten dollars per acre. The purchaser shall pay one-fifth of the price in cash, and the remaining four-fifths as follows:

One-fifth in five years, one-fifth on or before the expiration of ten years, one-fifth on or before the expiration of fifteen years, and one-fifth on or before the expiration of twenty years, with interest at the rate of not less than five per cent. per annum, payable annually in advance; provided, that when payments are made before due they shall be made at an interest paying date, and one year's interest in advance shall be paid on all money so paid. All sales shall be held at the county seat of the county in which the land to be sold is situated, and shall be at public auction and to the highest bidder, after sixty days' advertisement of the same in a newspaper of general circulation in the vicinity of the land to be sold, and one at the seat of government. Such lands as shall not have been specially sub-divided shall be offered in tracts of one-quarter section, and those sub-divided in the smallest sub-division. All lands designated for sale and not sold within two years after appraisal shall be re-appraised before they are sold. No grant or patent for such lands shall issue until payment is made for the same; provided, that the land contracted to be sold by the state shall be subject to taxation from the date of contract. In case the taxes assessed against any of said lands for any year remain unpaid until the first Monday in October of the following year, then thereupon the contract of sale for such lands shall, if the board of university and school lands so determine, become null and void. Any lands under the provisions of section 158 of the constitution of the state of North Dakota, that have heretofore been sold, may be paid for, except as to interest, as provided, further, that any school or institution lands that may be required for town site purposes, school house sites, church sites, cemetery sites, sites for other educational or charitable institutions, public parks, fair grounds, public highways, railroad right of way, or for other railroad uses and purposes, reservoirs for the storage of water for irrigation, drain ditches

or irrigation ditches, and lands that may be required for any of the purposes over which the right of eminent domain may be exercised under the constitution and the laws of the state of North Dakota, may be sold under the provisions of this section, and shall be paid for, principal and interest, in full, in advance, at the time of sale, or at any time thereafter, and patent issued therefor, when principal and interest are paid.

That section 91 of the constitution of the state of North Dakota is amended to read as follows:

Section 91. The term of office of the judges of the supreme court, except as in this article otherwise provided, shall be ten years, beginning on the first Tuesday after the first

Monday in January of the year next following their election, and they shall hold their offices until their successors are duly qualified. The section shall not be construed as extending the term of office of the judges serving at the time of the adoption of this amendment, except as herein provided. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court elected at the general election in 1910 shall be as follows: The one receiving the highest number of votes at such election shall hold his office for a term of ten years, the one receiving the next highest number of votes at such election shall hold his office for a term of eight years, and the one receiving the lowest number of votes at such election shall hold his office for a term of six years.
