Casselton Has Bad Fire This Morning

FIRST NATIONAL BANK AND OTHER BUILDINGS BURNED EARLY TODAY.

Casselton, N. D., Oct. 26.—Fire broke out in the ware room of Taubert's drug store at an early hour this morning and it had gained considerable headway before it was discovered. Before the flames could be gotten under control they had rapidly spread to the First National bank building, and the Northern Trading company. On the second floor of the bank, the offices of a number of lawyers and physicians were burned out and also a couple of bank employes who had rooms there. The loss is estimated from \$30,000 to \$40,000.
The buildings destroyed were the First National bank, Taubert's drug store, and the Northern Trading company.


