Man Supposed to Be Dead Located in V. C.

REWARD OFFERED AND SEARCH MADE IN SOUTH DAKOTA BUT NO TRACE FOUND—PARENTS GET LETTER.

Many people here will remember reading of the sudden disappearance of a young farmer at Beresford, S. D., something over a year ago. Diligent search was made in the neighborhood and later all over the state but nothing was heard of the man until very recently when his parents received a letter from him dated at Valley City where it is said he was employed by Otto Zetterberg. Mrs. F. E. Osborne, who formerly lived in that part of South Dakota is in receipt of a letter from relatives there and the information is conveyed that the parents of the boy whose name in Fahlberg are wealthy farmers and that the son was doing well, was in no trouble of any sort and was engaged to be married to a young lady down there, left suddenly after arranging everything in his barn to convey the impression that murder had been committed even to a bloody cap which was found in his barn. Nothing was learned of his whereabouts until a letter came to the parents which was signed Geo. Auker. In the letter he said that he was employed here but gave no reason for his strange actions.
