

## Nurse Dies at Minot Hospital

Minot, N. D., March 31.—Miss Lela Hooks, who has been engaged as a nurse at St. Joseph's hospital for the past eight months, died at that institution Saturday forenoon, her death following a brief illness of about ten days. Efforts on the part of a number of physicians to diagnose Miss Hooks' ailment proved futile and a post mortem examination will probably be held in an effort to determine the cause of death.

The father and mother of the deceased, who reside near Baden, were present at the time of the young lady's death. The body will be taken to Baden tomorrow for burial.

Miss Hooks had grown very popular among her associates at the hospital and was regarded very highly by her superiors. Her untimely death has caused great sorrow at St. Joseph's hospital and among her other friends about the city.

## Facing Serious Charge At New Rockford, N. D.

Last Friday morning Sheriff Faber and Deputy Hart created quite a consternation in certain quarters of New Rockford by proceeding to gather in under warrants sworn to by J. W. Dodge, five men who were alleged to have committed the crime of peddling intoxicating liquors. The crime as charged, consists of bootlegging, as it is commonly termed.

It will be remembered that the last legislature passed a law making this offense a felony, punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary for six months. The bill has no emergency clause attached and became law February twenty-first, when the governor approved the same.

This is the first arrest under the new law in Eddy county and should the defendants be found guilty of bootlegging will be sent to the state "pen" at Bismarck. The common, or old charge of selling intoxicating liquor is also laid against the defendants, the penalty for which is the same as before to-wit: Minimum, 90 days in jail and \$200 fine. As the law now stands there is practically three different crimes of selling liquor, that of bootlegging, selling intoxicating liquor and maintaining a common liquor nuisance. Besides there is the injunctive proceedings in the nature of a civil action where buildings where liquor is sold or allowed to be drunk as a beverage, may be closed for a year and all costs made a lien against the premises.

It does seem that with all these laws to work on, the liquor traffic in the state should not amount to much, still there appear to be men who will take very desperate chances in order to make a few dollars easy, expecting of course, that he who wants liquor bad, will not complain, still all those caught in the net will find that a violator of prohibition laws stands a very slim show of acquittal if the evidence is clear, no matter who he may be or what his occupation in other lines.
