

IN THE WORLD OF "MOVIES"

Realizing that the theatre going public has become inalienably attached to the moving picture theatre, and that it represents the source of amusement of a majority of the people of Valley City, the Times-Record has decided to publish once each week a brief resume of what the moving picture manufacturers are doing for our entertainment. The comment will be brief, but it is hoped that they will help enlighten the public as to what is the best to be had in this line, and enable them to appreciate the offerings of the Valley City play house (or play houses, as the case will be in a few months.)

That the manufacturers of moving pictures have not yet reached the limit in elaborateness of productions is indicated by the announcement this week of the production of "Ivanhoe," with a huge company of English players. The medieval costumes and costumes of living are faithfully reproduced, and the series of three reels is said

to be one of the most spectacular features ever produced.

Actor stars in the "legitimate" have come to recognize the moving picture as one of the best mediums for placing their talents before the public. An indication of the attitude of the best actors before the public is found in the following list of plays which will be offered in the near future: Mary Pickford in The Bishop's Carriage; Henry Dixie in Chelsea 7750; Lily Langtry in His Neighbor's Wife; Laura Sawyer in An Hour Before Dawn.

The English government has accepted the moving picture as a welcome addition to the educational forces of the little island. The war secretary has arranged for the free use of English troops for pictures, the idea being that the films will prove of great value to the British public in rousing patriotism and creating an interest in the army.

Germ of Rabies Reported Found

ROCKEFELLER INSTITUTE SURGEON ANNOUNCES DISCOVERY OF CULTIVATION OF BACILLI.

New York, Sept. 8.—Physicians were interested today in the announcement that Dr. Hydeo Noguchi, of the Rockefeller institute for medical research in this city, had discovered and cultivated the germs of rabies. For thirty years pathologists have sought to isolate the germ which produces hydrophobia, but without success. Dr. Noguchi, after describing his researches says:

"The method that has yielded the result to be reported is similar to that employed successfully for the cultivation of the spirochaetae of relapsing fever. In the cultures very minute granular bodies arise which on subsequent transplantation, of re-appear in the new cultures through many generations. The same bodies are obtained from 'street,' 'passages' and 'fixed' virus.

"On four different occasions I observed in the cultures from 'passage' and 'fixed' virus, nucleated round or oval bodies, surrounded with membranes totally different from the more minute granular bodies, although arising in the cultures in which the latter occurred. Their appearance was sudden in the cultures in which the latter then and their duration four to five days, when they diminished, coincident with an increase in granular bodies. In one of the four instances the larger bodies appeared in a culture obtained from the brain of a rabbit, previously inoculated with a culture of 'passage' virus which had given rise to the symptoms of rabies. In two of the instances the larger nucleated bodies arose in cultures prepared from 'fixed' virus in which the granular bodies were difficult to demonstrate either in sections or in films."

What might have been a serious accident was narrowly averted last Tuesday evening when S. P. Nokken and Joe Vandrovac ran into each other on the road near the Porter farm. The gentlemen were driving their autos in opposite directions and attempted to pass each other when the accident occurred. Aside from bending the fenders and axels of both machines, no serious damage was done. — Rogers Citizen.

RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Valley City, North Dakota, at a regular meeting thereof, did heretofore deem it necessary to extend the water mains on Main street and Eastside Avenue, as hereinafter more specifically set forth for the better fire protection of the residents of the water main district in which said extension is to be made, and did thereupon direct the city engineer of the city of Valley City to prepare plans, specifications and estimates touching the extension of said water mains, commencing at the center line of First Ave. on Main street, thence east along Main street and across the Sheyenne River to the east end of Lot 24, Block 2, of Morrison's Addition and a branch main connecting with said water main at the intersection of Main street and Eastside Avenue, running south and east on said Eastside Avenue to the east corner of Lot 1, of Zetterberg's subdivision of Lots "A" and "B" and Lot 8 of Riverside Park Addition to Valley City, N. D.

WHEREAS, The City Engineer did thereafter duly prepare and file with the City Auditor plans, specifications and estimates touching said proposed extension of said water mains upon said streets and avenues as aforesaid, which said plans, specifications and estimates are now on file in the office of the City Auditor of the City of Valley City; and

WHEREAS, The said City Council of the City of Valley City, the Mayor concurring therein, did after the filing of said report by the City Engineer in the office of the City Auditor of said City, by resolution duly approve said report as made and returned by said City Engineer; now therefore.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, By the City Council of the City of Valley City, North Dakota, the Mayor and two thirds of all the members elected, qualified and acting concurring, and upon said plans, specifications and estimates, and the report of the City Engineer of said City, as filed with the City Auditor, approved by the City Council in said matter, that the extension of said water mains of said City as above set forth is necessary to be done, according to plans and specifications of the City Engineer so on file with the City Auditor in said matter; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the expense thereof shall be defrayed by special assessment against the particular lots and parcels of land which will in the opinion of the "Special Assessment Commission" be especially benefited by the construction of the water mains aforesaid, and which lots or parcels of land are located in the water main district as heretofore by the City Council established, and in which said district the extension of said water mains is to be made and constructed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be published twice, once in each week for two consecutive weeks, in the official newspaper of the City of Valley City, North Dakota, and that all persons interested be hereby requested and commanded to take notice accordingly.

Which said resolution was at a meeting of said City Council of the City of Valley City, North Dakota, held on the 4th day of August, A. D. 1913, duly adopted.
