The Barnes County Corn Show.

It takes products to make a show. It takes industrious people and a good soil to raise these products. We must make the second annual corn show bigger and better than the first, held in Barnes county, and if this can be done it will show agricultural progress which is the kind of progress that counts.

Prepare to take a day of two off to view the exhibits at Valley City on November 20th, 21st, and 22nd. See what Barnes county can do in corn raising. See the various exhibits of alfalfa from the numerous fields in the county. See the corn, potatoes and chickens produced by the boys and girls of Barnes county, and the numerous other exhibits that will be of interest.

As farmers, as citizens interested in agricultural progress you cannot afford to miss this show. Remember the time, November 20, 21 and 22.

The Local Corn Shows.

The following people will regularly take part in the program and will be responsible for the judging of the exhibits at each one of the fairs: Minnie J. Nielson, Edwin Mayland, O. A. Parton, T. X. Calnan. In so far as possible additional people will be brought in to take part.

The following is a general outline of the program:

10:30—General Session for men and women.

1:30-3:30—Children's Session Talks on Corn and Potato Raising. Story Telling.

1:30-3:30—Homemakers' Session. Household Economy.

1:30-3:30—Farmers' Session. Talks on Alfalfa and Livestock.

1:30-3:30—Judging of Exhibits.

Several rooms will be required to properly conduct the above program. The "General Session for Men and Women" in the morning may possibly be held to the best advantage in some room at the school house or some hall other than where the exhibits are to be placed. During this session talks will be given by Minnie J. Nielson on "Lub Work for Women" and by Ed-

win Mayland on "Farmers' Club Activities." Talks by other people will also be given in so far as speakers can be obtained. The afternoon program will require three separate rooms, one for the Childrens' Session, one for the Homemakers' Session, and one for the Farmers' Session. Where there is a Farmers' Club the president or secretary of same will no doubt take charge of the Farmers' Session, otherwise it must be done by some of the business men or a farmer.

The Pupils' Exhibit is a distinct exhibit from the Farmers' Display. Prizes will only be given to pupils who are known to have taken part in the contest work and it must be known that pupils receiving prizes must actually have raised their own corn, potatoes, and chickens and they must have raised their own breed thus put on exhibition.

Kathryn is going to put on a Live Stock Exhibit of Dairy Cattle and Hogs. First, second and third prizes are offered for the best pure bred dairy sires of any breed over two years and also for the best grade dairy cows over three years. First, second and third prizes are also offered for the best herd of three spring sow pigs.

Litchville is planning to put on an automobile parade at 10 a. m. sharp and are offering prizes to farmers with the best appearing automobiles.

It is being contemplated to hold the Barnes County Corn Show at Valley City at the conclusion of the local fairs. In order that the County Corn Show may be as big as possible it should contain all the prize winning exhibits from the local fairs. In order that this may be carried out each town will arrange to withhold all prize winning exhibits, keep them until just before the time of the Corn Show, then pack them all together in a box, keeping the exhibits and names intact and send it to Valley City.

At the Fair Meeting last summer it was agreed to by those present that each town contribute \$5.00 out of its general prize fund which would go towards the making up of a county prize for the boys obtaining the three highest yields in the acre yield contest. The prizes offered by the banks to the boys in the acre yield contest this year are on a statewide basis, the state being divided for this purpose into the northern and southern sections. No county prizes are being offered by the banks.
