

Johnston Bank Changes Hands

MARION INSTITUTION PURCHASED BY VALLEY CITY BANKERS.

During the past week the majority interest in the stock of the Johnston State Bank, of Marion, formerly owned by Messrs. Johnston of St. Paul, was sold by them to Jas. J. Earley, Walter Coop and K. A. Bonhus of Valley City, who have already assumed control. The decision to sell is in accordance with the plan of the Johnstons to close out all their interests at Marion. At a meeting of the board of directors held at the bank on Thursday the resignations of the Johnstons were accepted and the new owners were elected to the board, which now consists of five directors as follows: C. A. Arnes, K. A. Bonhus, Walter Coop, Jas. J. Earley and Paul G. Stitz. Mr. Earley was elected president in place of D. S. B. Johnston.

Mr. Earley speaks of the purchase and of their future plans, as follows: "It is true that we have bought the controlling interest in the Johnston State Bank after a careful examination of its condition, in which we found everything in first class shape. We bought it as an investment and will take our share in the responsibility of its future management. Messrs. Arnes and Magnuson will continue in their present positions. Under the former management the bank has done well, taking care of its customers in years of short crops as well as in seasons of abundance, and henceforth we shall strive to do better, if possible."

Fargo Wants Men On Conspiracy Charge

CAPITAL SECURITY OFFICIALS INDICTED ON CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY.

Norfolk, Va., Dec. 1.—Samuel Harris, president, and J. G. Thalaker, secretary-treasurer of the Capital Security company with its home offices here, was arrested today upon indictments found against them in Fargo, N. D., charging them with conspiracy to defraud by use of the mails.

The defendants gave bail of \$2,000 to appear Tuesday before the United States commissioner. They resisted efforts to have them sent to Fargo.
