REMOVAL PETITION STARTED BY CITIZENS

Lidgerwood, N. D., March 28.—Charging that they have been negligent in the enforcement of the prohibition law, a petition is being circulated here asking for the removal of Sheriff Frank Budack, State's Atty. C. J. Kachelhoffer, and the assistant state's attorney of Richland county, and of the mayor and two policemen of Lidgerwood.

It is said that this petition will be sent to Governor Hanna today. The governor has power to remove delinquent officers, this power having been conferred upon him by the last legislature, and the petition will probably result in a thorough investigation of the charges by the governor.

Mr. Casper Winkler of Valley City dropped off at Kathryn between trains Tuesday. He is out for the position of sheriff and handed us his announcement. Casper does not need introduction, he is well known.—Kathryn Recorder.

MAY HAVE BEEN FAKE CONFESSION IN COOPER CASE

Salem, Ore., March 28.—That an alleged confession upon the strength of which Governor Hanna of North Dakota issued a requisition for the return to that state of McLain Cooper, charged with bribing jurors of a trial at which he was acquitted of murder, was not made by Cooper at all, but by W. H. McGruder, with whom detectives had scraped an acquaintance in a Portland saloon, was one of the sensations produced at Cooper's hearing before Miss Fern Hobbs, acting for Governor West today.

Miss Hobbs is West's secretary. McGruder himself testified that on the night of Jan. 24 last, at the request of J. A. Sullivan (who, it was alleged, is a detective), he went to the Imperial hotel where he, followed Sullivan's instructions, pretending to be Cooper and conducted a conversation which, when transcribed by a shorthand reporter, who was concealed in an adjoining bathroom, would lead to the inevitable conclusion that Cooper had participated in jury bribing.

McGruder's appearance was a complete surprise to R. G. Skulason, the attorney representing the state of North Dakota. He had been discovered only a few hours before by Ellis Cooper, who is conducting an earnest effort to prevent Cooper from being returned to North Dakota where, he says, he is wanted, not on a charge of jury bribing, but as a witness in a \$50,000 civil suit against Harry Cooper, the father. This suit has been brought by the heirs of James Ross, for the murder of whom Cooper was tried and acquitted on the grounds of self-defense. Miss Hobbs will make her report to Gov. West this week.

It appears that Sullivan and R. W. Bradfield came to Portland about Jan. 16 last, and they passed much of their time at the Oxford bar, where they met McGruder. Sullivan was free with his money and McGruder cultivated his friendship. On the night of Jan. 24, according to McGruder's testimony, Sullivan asked him to do a favor. He assented. They went to Sullivan's room at the Imperial hotel. On the way to the hotel McGruder said Sullivan told him he wanted to get a statement from a "man named Cooper," and that all he would need to do would be to answer his questions affirmatively, and that a shorthand reporter would be in an adjoining room to take down the questions and answers.

MOTT PEOPLE WERE CORDIAL TO GOVERNOR

Mott, N. D., March 28.—The Hettinger County Educational association meeting, which opened in this city today and will continue tomorrow, is proving a great success. In fact, today saw the biggest crowd in the city's history, which gathered largely to meet Governor Hanna, who addressed the association and the general public.

When the governor arrived this afternoon he was greeted at the train with much honor, there being a citizen's committee, a committee from the Commercial club and the mayor.

A smoker was held in the Commercial Club rooms from 5:00 to 6:00, and was attended by 100 business men. At 6 o'clock a banquet was given at the Brown hotel, when 100 citizens sat at the board.

After the banquet the governor was greeted at the school house by 500 people, who turned out to hear what he had to say. The governor was introduced by Rev. Alex Douglas, for one and one-half hours the governor held his audience in closest attention.

After the speaking the Mother's club tendered the governor a reception and all were given an opportunity to meet him personally.

It was the greatest reception ever accorded a person in this part of the state. Owing to the fact that there are no trains running on the Milwaukee, due to the storm, people from New England and Haverlock were unable to attend, though many drove from Regent.

The governor will leave Friday morning for Bismarck.
