While in Minneapolis recently a representative of the Times Record spent some time in conversation with several of the officers in the Soo building and learned that the only improvements that were contemplated was a new depot, some yard improvements, a better service on the electric line and improvements on the roadbed across the county.

Sometimes in the future it is altogether likely that the Soo Line may use the N. P. highline bridge, but even that time is so far removed that the company is contemplating the building of a better depot at the present site.

Munchausen II. Unlucky. Who was the original Munchausen that told the delightful "stretchers"? Raspe is commonly supposed to have founded his hero upon Hieronymus Karl Friedrich von Munchausen, who had fought with the Russians against the Turks and died in 1797. But the Rev. S. Baring-Gould has told the story of a swindler who appeared at Halberstadt in 1702 giving out his name as Baron Karl Friedrich Munchausen. He married a wealthy lady there and told the most astonishing yarns of his travels and adventures. The rest of his career was short. In June, 1763, he murdered his wife, and in August he was executed.—London Chronicle.

Early Treatment of Servants. In a selection from the Newdigate family archives published by Lady Newdigate-Newdigate we get a glimpse of the way servants were treated in the seventeenth century. Sir Richard Newdigate, who flourished under Charles II, enters in his diary a list of fines imposed for various crimes: "Nan Newton, for breaking a teapot, 2s. 6d.; Ri. Knight, for pride and slighting, 2s. 6d.; William Hetherington, for not being ready to go to church three Sundays, 18d.; Cook, dead drunk, 10s." He had a system of rewards as well as penalties, one of the entries reading, "To Tom Cooper, who worked hard after I broke his head, 2s. 6d."—London Chronicle.

If an experiment that is being given a trial by a firm of Paris hatmakers proves satisfactory the likelihood would seem to be good that a permanent market will be found for jack-rabbit pelts. Eighty thousand of these were recently shipped to France, where they will be manufactured into hats.

A field of alfalfa that is several years old and well rooted will stand a good deal of harrowing and mellowing in the spring before the growth starts without doing it any harm. Such harrowing not only kills many weeds, but puts the soil in such tith that the new alfalfa shoots will make a vigorous and rapid growth.

This matter of the exhibition of a good sized apple within a small mouthful is no particularly wonderful thing when one understands how it is done. The way to do it is to slip the bottle over a twig bearing a blossom and fastening the bottle in place so that it will not slide off. As the apple grows it will fill the bottle.

GUNMEN ELECTROCUTED TODAY AT OSSINING, N. Y.

Four Youths Convicted of the Murder of Herman Rosenthal, Maintained Innocence Until the End.

SPEND SUNDAY IN PRAYER

Albany, N. Y., April 12.—When told tonight that Justice Goff had refused the gunmen a new trial, Governor Glynn said: "There is nothing I care to say."
Immediately Mr. Glynn notified Deputy Joe E. Pidgeon, who had been ordered to keep the secretary of state's office open all night to close the office until 9 a. m. Sunday. Mr. Pidgeon in case a reprieve were granted would affix the state's great seal to the document.

Governor Glynn is frankly agitated over the gunmen's case. It has caused him much mental distress and worry. Tonight there is a feeling that he may grant an eleventh hour reprieve. In some quarters it was said that Prison Superintendent Riley visited Sing Sing last night upon the suggestion of Governor Glynn that Frank Cirofici might be induced to confess. Efforts of Mr. Riley to extract admissions from Frank are reported to have met with the Italian boy's repeated declaration that he was not present when Rosenthal was shot and knew nothing of the plot to kill the gambler.

New York, April 11.—The four gunmen convicted of the murder of Herman Rosenthal must die.
Justice Goff of the supreme court late tonight denied the application of their counsel for a new trial, shattering the last hope of the men that they might be saved from the electric chair. Monday is the day set for the execution of the gunmen in Sing Sing prison.

The men who will go to their death are: Harry Horowitz ("Gyp the Blood"), Frank Cirofici ("Dago Frank"), Louis Rosenberg ("Lefty Louie") and Jacob Seidenshner ("Whitey Lewis").


