GRADUATION EXERCISES CLOSE SUMMER SCHOOL

With the close of the summer term at the State Normal school here today, diplomas were this afternoon presented to forty-two more members of the class of 1914 and certificates to thirty-six students completing the course for rural teachers. Not counting those of the rural course, this makes a total of nearly 180 members of the regular Normal school courses alone to complete their work thus far this year. Practically everyone who wished it is already located in a teaching position for the fall.

At an interesting program beginning at 2:30 this afternoon, with the members of the rural class seated on the platform, Miss Minnie Albers presented an interesting and instructive paper on "The County School Teacher." Alma Nace gave an accurate review of "The Corn Lady." Dora Forsberg read a paper on "The Rights of the Country Child," and Olive Sorenson a paper on "Country Conventions."

Music was furnished by Miss Amidon's class in supervisor's music and the program contained a violin solo by Anders Froy-saa.

Dr. McKeever was the speaker of the afternoon touching upon some of the potent phases of the modern country life and country school problems.

Following the address, Prof. B. A. Wallace, in a few well chosen remarks presented the class to President McFarland, who replied and presented the members with their certificates.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Consul Silliman at Saltillo reported that General Carranza had been advised that Mexico City was evacuated by the federals today.

The dispatch says it is understood President Carbajal left for Vera Cruz with the beginning of the evacuation. Governor Iturbide and other federal officials, accompanied by the Brazilian minister, representing the United States left Mexico City today for General Obregon's camp at Tula to arrange the peaceful entry of the constitutional army.

The federal troops have evacuated the capital, leaving the city in charge of the municipal police, who by agreement are regarded as neutral. The federals withdrew from the city to a nearby point, there to await the announcement of amnesty from Carranza. Should the guarantees be refused, officials here have no doubt a counter revolution will be immediately set in motion.

With the entry of the constitutional forces into Mexico City, the question of recognition for the new government will confront Washington. There is every reason to believe recognition will be withheld until there is an election, or a political convention at which time expression of the attitude of the people toward the new government can be obtained.

London, Aug. 12.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Paris says it is announced officially that engagements between French and Germans have taken place along the Franco-Belgian frontier at Longwy and Longuyon, on French territory and at Virton on Belgian territory to the southwest of Arlon. German cavalry patrols have been met also to the north of Montmedy on the Franco-Belgian frontier.

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
