### News of the State

Fargo has been chosen as the home of what will be the most complete and modern service plant of the Ford Motor Co., not only in the northwest but in the United States. The new building will be located on Broadway.

A business portion of Kathryn might have been destroyed last Saturday morning if it had not been for the timely discovery of fire that originated in the Kathryn hotel. The origin of the fire was unknown.

By a supreme court decision Bowbells is declared victorious in the fight for the county seat of Burke county, which has dragged through the courts for four years. Bowbells' claim to the seat of government was contested by Lignite.

In a fit of jealousy Edward Lawrence, aged 34, of LaMoure, shot and killed his stepdaughter, Miss Hattie Foat. Then he shot at his feeble wife, but missed her, and attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself in the head. He will live however, but both eyes were shot out.

Two Catholic priests, Rev. Father Edward, assistant rector of the Catholic church of Devils Lake, and Father Anthony of Berwick, N. D., are marooned in Germany, as a result of the war, with little prospects of early departure. Father Edward is in Germany and Father Anthony in Switzerland.

Mrs. Antoinette Funk, Chicago lawyer and woman suffragist, was arrested, fined her \$5, but remitted the fine. ordinance which prohibits street speaking without a permit. Judge Lynch, before whom she was arraigned, fined her \$5, but remitted the fine. It is understood, however that there will be an appeal taken to test the law.

Some of the contractors on the Northern extension work here report that it has been suggested to them to leave their machinery here till spring as there may be a further extension of the Northern Pacific line now being completed to Ollie, south of Beach, to connect with the present Mott line.

Editor Graham of the Schaffer Record has established the Watford Guide, and a number of the business men are establishing branch stores. Watford will be the nearest railroad point.

The three-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Garfield Marcotte, living three miles north of Wolford spent a whole night in the open fields and not withstanding her exposure to the heavy rain that fell just before daylight Monday morning, is apparently none the worse for her exposure. The little one wandered away about dusk while the mother was out milking and probably was gone about an hour before being missed. A search was made and shortly before daylight the child was found.
