KAISER WILL MAKE SOME LARGE DEMANDS

If Germany Wins Will Expect to Exterminate England.

Paris, Oct. 15.—George Clemenceau published a letter which he says he received from an American diplomat relating a conversation which Ambassador Bernstorff had with a German-American banker at Newport at the end of August. The banker handed the ambassador a check for the German Red Cross and then asked, "what does the kaiser expect to get from France if he wins?" Ambassador Bernstorff, according to this letter, replied:

- These are tender comments regarding France. We shall demand: 1—All the French colonies, including Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia. 2—French territory from Main Valery to Lyons or one quarter of France with 15,000,000 inhabitants. 3—An indemnity of two billion dollars. 4—A commercial treaty enabling German goods to enter France free of duty for 25 years without reciprocity and then a resumption of the terms of the Frankfort treaty. 5—The suppression of recruiting in France for 25 years. 6—The demolition of all French fortresses. 7—France to surrender 3,000,000 rifles, three thousand guns and forty thousand horses. 8—Free patent rights without reciprocity for 25 years. 9—France to abandon diplomatic relations with England and Russia. 10—A treaty of Alliance with Germany for 25 years.

Regarding Russia, Ambassador Bernstorff added, according to this letter:

We shall buy her and then exterminate England. The latter will attack Russia for treachery and both would call on us for help. Above all, we must crush France and reduce her to the condition of Portugal, or Turkey, even if it is necessary to kill five million Frenchmen.
