SPRAGUE NAMED TO U. N. D. BOARD

The resignation of Judge N. C. Young of Fargo, president of the trustees of the University of North Dakota, has been accepted by Governor Hanna, and Frank H. Sprague of Grafton appointed to the board in his place.

Judge Young has served on the board of trustees for eight years. Although it was known by intimate friends that the Fargo jurist contemplated taking this step, it is not known just what is the definite cause of his resignation being filed. Judge Young states that, having served eight years, he considers it is time for someone else to fill the position.

Mr. Sprague has been prominently identified with the business interests of the state for 32 years, moving to Grafton in 1882. He is a native of New York state. He is connected with the first National bank of Grafton and is prominent in the Masonic organization of North Dakota.

Paris, Nov. 17.—The following official communication was issued by the war office Sunday night:

"The most notable incident of the day has been the throwing back of the enemy on the right bank of the Yser canal. That part of the left bank which the Germans previously held has been completely evacuated.

"We have re-taken to the south of Bixchoote a small wood which had been lost following a night attack.

"At the end of the day the enemy had shown, without success, an offensive to the south of Yver.

"On the rest of the front there is nothing to report."

PUBLIC SCHOOL GARDEN CONTEST

Last spring the public schools of the city offered to the grade pupils small garden plots on the high school farm. First, second and third prizes were offered of three, two and one dollar respectively, based on the best kept garden all round.

The plots were about twelve by twenty-four feet. The following vegetables were sown. Radish, lettuce, beans, beets, carrots, peas, onions, parsnips, sweet corn, some having cabbage or tomatoes. SULTAN SUMMONS MOSLEMS TO WAR

FATE OF 300,000,000 FOLLOWERS OF ALLAH DEPENDS ON VICTORY, HE SAYS.

Constantinople, Nov. 17.—The sultan has issued a proclamation to the army and navy in which he accuses Great Britain, France and Russia of having instigated the war upon Turkey. He adds: "Not only the fate of our country, but the future existence of 300,000,000 Moslems, depends on your victory." The statement ends with a call to all Moslems to take up arms.

Berlin, Nov. 17.—Press dispatches received in Berlin describe the proclamation at Constantinople of a holy war as arousing great enthusiasm in the Turkish capital. Huge processions are reported to have paraded the streets, the people making sympathetic demonstrations before the German and Austrian embassies.

The news dispatches say it is expected in Constantinople that the Moslems in all countries will make common cause with Turkey in the war.

Vienna, Nov. 17.—The whole press today emphasizes the importance of the proclamation of holy war by the sultan.

N. D. LIVESTOCK BOARD PROHIBITS CATTLE SHIPMENT INTO THE STATE

George, the 5-year-old son of Mrs. George Hass at Oakes was slightly injured in the eye by a knife in the hands of his 7-year-old brother Charles. The boys were playing and Charles was trying to cut a rope from a wagon while George held it. The rope gave away easier than was expected and the knife slipping striking George in the eye.

The North Dakota Live Stock Sanitary board has prohibited the shipping of live stock into the state until further notice. The only exception is on cattle going through the state and they must be kept moving and can only be taken from the trains in railroad stock yards for food, water and rest. The order of the board is as follows:

HEAVY ARTILLERY GOES OVER BORDER

Portal, N. D., Nov. 16. — A special train of artillery, composed of thirty five cars containing six unmounted cannon and parts complete, passed through here tonight enroute to the Canadian coast. The barrels of the guns measured almost 40 feet in length, three feet at the breach and over nine inches at the muzzle, and each occupied a single car. The remaining cars were filled with massive steel plates and crates containing the mechanism. From all appearances the cannon are intended for land fortifications.

The shipment originated at South Bethlehem, Pa., and was delivered at this point to the Casacan Pacific railway with Vancouver wharf as the destination. It is claimed by some Canadian authorities that the artillery is intended for the new fortifications on Vancouver island and others state they are for fortifications in the Philippines or Hawaiian islands. There was considerable conjecture as to the ultimate destination and the sight of so much war material so near the "war zone" caused much excitement here.

London, Nov. 17.—The correspondent at Constantinople of Reuter's Telegram Co., forwarded a dispatch by way of Berlin says:

"Turkish troops have occupied Kotur (a town with a population of 8,000) in the Persian province of Azerbaijan, which has been in the hands of the Russians. Russian troops fled. "British troops have landed near Basra on the coast of the Province of the Persian gulf. While landing the British were attacked and lost sixty men."

Prairie fires have done great damage in Williams county, in some places to the amount of \$25,000. The flames destroyed farm buildings and large quantities of hay and grain.

Having determined that a contagious communicable disease known as the foot and mouth disease exists in several states at this time, and that the admission of cattle, sheep and swine into North Dakota may be the means of introducing the disease into the state, the following regulations are hereby established.

Section 1. The shipment or movement of any cattle, sheep or swine into this state is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. Any shipments of stock of the above class destined to this state that may be en route on this date must be held at railroad destination and subjected to inspection by an agent of this board.

Section 3. This will not prohibit the movement of interstate shipments through this state where said shipments comply with orders issued by the United States secretary of agriculture, provided same are not diverted enroute or fed and watered at public stockyards. Provided that cattle and sheep en route from states lying west of North Dakota destined to slaughter centers outside this state may be unloaded at railway stock yards for rest, feeding and watering purposes only, but are not permitted outside stockyards.

Section 4. No stock of the above class originating in this state shall be shipped from one point to another point within this state unless loaded in stock cars that have been properly disinfected.

Section 5. These regulations are established by authority granted in chapter 169, S. L. 1907, and will remain in force until further notice.
