

NEW BILLS IN LEGISLATURE

Stock Sanitary board and limits indemnity to \$150.

No. 81—Introduced by Burgett. Referred to committee on banks and banking. Requiring the legal reserve fund of banking corporations to be 15 per cent of its deposits, two-fifths of which must be in cash and the three-fifths may be in balances due from state, national banks or trust companies in cities where these banks are large enough to be classed as depositary banks.

No. 82—Introduced by Jahr. Referred to committee on public printing. Prescribes a penalty for newspapers who offer prizes or rewards in a subscription contest of one hundred to five hundred dollars fine.

No. 83—Introduced by Carney. Referred to committee on judiciary. Authorizes anyone who is commissioned by the religious body to an act amending laws to permit persons authorized to do so by their religious bodies to perform marriages.

No. 84—Introduced by Wiley. Referred to committee on ways and means. Amends act relating to and defining unfair competition. Prohibiting the discrimination between different sections of the state in purchasing or selling any commodity in general use.

No. 85—Introduced by Bratten. Referred to committee on public printing. Amending Chapter 129 of laws of 1911 and repealing Chapter 226 of laws of 1913 to publication of the publicity pamphlet.

No. 86—Introduced by L. L. Twichell. Referred to committee on municipal corporations. An act permitting city councils and village boards in towns having a public auditorium or hall to levy a tax to pay for the heating, lighting and incidental expenses of renting hall or auditorium for the holding of public meetings.

No. 87—Introduced by L. L. Twichell. Referred to committee on judiciary. Defining the meaning of the words trustee, cashier, agent and like terms in instruments filed with register of deeds to mean that they are merely "descriptio personem."

No. 88—Introduced by Baldwin. Referred to committee on judiciary. Amending act 7949 of laws of 1913 prohibiting the use of the act by any party to an action who has engaged a member of the legislature as his attorney within 60 days or during the session of the legislature. This act requires judges to continue all suits to next term of court in which the attorney in case files affidavit that he is a member of the legislature.

SENATE.

Senate Bill No. 82, Murphy—For an act authorizing county courts to accept surety company bonds for executors, administrators and guardians for one-half the amount required where personal bonds are furnished, plus ten per cent. Committee on judiciary.

Senate Bill No. 83, Paulson—For an act making an appropriation of \$40,000 for building and premiums on insurance for the state normal school at Mayville, N. D. Committee on appropriations.

Senate Bill No. 84, Clark—For an act to amend Section 1383 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, relating to branches to be taught in the public schools. Provides course in domestic science for girls after July 1, 1916; course in treatment and prevention of tuberculosis and other infectious and contagious diseases. Committee on education.

Senate Bill No. 85, Clark—For an act to amend Section 1383 of the Compiled Laws of 1913 relating to branches to be taught in the public schools. Provides course in manual training for boys after July 1, 1916; course in the treatment and prevention of tuberculosis and other infectious and contagious diseases. Committee on education.

Senate Bill No. 86, Warner—For an act to provide for the incorporation of local lodges or camps of Modern Woodmen of America or other similar fraternal associations not issuing fraternal insurance policies on certificates. Committee on insurance.

Senate Bill No. 87, Overson—For an act to define procedure in county courts in matters not within the scope of increased jurisdiction therein, and in cases of the organization of new counties wherein proceedings have already begun and remain incomplete in the new county, by reason of the new county court acquiring jurisdiction therein. Committee on judiciary.

Senate Bill No. 88, Lindstrom—For an act to amend and re-enact Section 790, Compiled Laws of 1913, relating to the qualifications of applicants for admission to the bar of the state of North Dakota; requires three years' study in specified manner before persons may become applicants for admission. Committee on judiciary.

Senate Bill No. 89, Rowe—For an act to establish a state department of health, providing for a superintendent of health who shall devote his entire time to said office, and providing for six advisory members. Committee on public health.

Senate Bill No. 90, Jacobson—For an act to provide for the representation of the state of North Dakota at the Panama-California exposition to be held in San Diego, California, in 1915, making appropriations of \$2,500 for same. Said representative to be appointed by the governor. Committee on appropriations.

Senate Bill No. 91, Albrecht—For an act to amend Section 1252 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, relating to supervision of schools in special districts. Committee on education.

Senate bills passed as amended: Senate Bills Nos. 43 and 51.

Concurrent resolutions received from the House:

Concurrent resolution relating to unsettled lands in western part of the state of North Dakota, and relating in particular to leasehold law now before congress. Committee on state affairs.

House bills received and referred: H. B. No. 3—Committee on ways and means.

H. B. No. 31—Committee on corporations other than municipal.

H. B. No. 56—Committee on judiciary.

HOUSE.

H. B. No. 111, Balsdon—An act to provide for making contracts in writing between owners of land and brokers or agents employed to sell such land for the filing of such contract with the register of deeds, and prescribing his fee therefor and for the delivering of such contracts to the buyer of such land before consideration is paid for same. Referred to committee on judiciary.

H. B. No. 112, Moeckel—An act providing for the licensing of auctioneers; regulating the charges and prescribing penalties for violation thereof. Referred to committee on ways and means.

H. B. No. 113, Pendray—An act to amend Section 8970 of Article 3 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the year 1913, relating to the clerk of court. His act would decrease the salaries of clerks of court. Referred to committee on judiciary.

H. B. No. 114, Smith of Kidder—Enlarging the act defining the crime of bootlegging so as to include agents and solicitors, either paid or unpaid, and fixing the punishment therefore and repealing Sections 10144 and 10145 of Compiled Laws of 1913. Referred to committee on temperance.

H. B. No. 115, McClellan—An act amending Chapter 93 of the session laws of 1909, relating to compensation of election officers, so as to increase the compensation of these officers to 40 cents per hour. Referred to committee on elections and election privileges.

H. B. No. 116, Hendrickson—An act to provide state aid to county fairs and making an appropriation therefor. No county to receive more than \$300 any one year and must raise an equal amount to the sum asked of the state by private subscription. Calls for an annual appropriation of \$15,000 or a much thereof as is necessary to carry out the provisions of this act. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 117, Carney—An act to repeal Section 7846 of Compiled Laws of 1913, relating to appeals in cases tried without a jury. Repeals the Newman act but excepts all pending actions from the operation of this act. Referred to committee on judiciary.

H. B. No. 118, Harris—An act to amend and re-enact Section 19466 compiled laws of 1913, relating to expenditure of money by contract for road improvements and road machinery by county commissioners. Includes power to spend money for road machinery and provides that bids be advertised for. Referred to committee on state affairs.

H. B. No. 120, Burnett—An act making an appropriation of \$40,000 for the state normal school at Mayville, for a training school building and premium on insurance. Referred to committee on appropriation.

H. B. No. 121, Stinger—An act to abolish the office of school treasurer and to make the county treasurer ex-officio treasurer of all the school districts in this county. Referred to committee on education.

H. B. No. 122, L. L. Twichell—An act to limit tax levies during the year 1915 and 1916, to restrict the limits, and to regulate salaries of officers and the rights and duties of officials now dependent upon assessed valuation. Tax of 1915 to be not more than a 5 per cent increase on 1914

assessed valuation and tax of 1916 not more than 10 per cent of an increase on 1914 valuation. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 123, L. L. Twichell—An act requiring assessors to assess all taxable property at its true money value, and requiring boards of review and boards of equalization to review and equalize all assessments according to the true money value of the assessed property; providing a penalty for failure to do so, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 124, L. L. Twichell—An act to repeal the sections of the 1913 laws levying a tax of one mill for the universities, agricultural college, Mayville, Valley City and Ellendale Normal schools, school of science at Wahpeton, and school of forestry at Bottineau. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 125, L. L. Twichell—An act to repeal the tax of not to exceed one-fifth of a mill for maintenance of county agricultural and training schools. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 126, L. L. Twichell—An act to repeal the tax of one-tenth of a mill to provide a wolf bounty. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 127, L. L. Twichell—An act to repeal the tax of one-twentieth of a mill to provide a bovine tuberculosis fund. Referred to committee on appropriations.

H. B. No. 128, L. L. Twichell—An act to repeal the tax of one-tenth of a mill to provide a glandered horse fund. Referred to committee on appropriations.
