Anna Nelson was born June 4, 1854, at Edrup, Jutland, Denmark. She was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran church. In 1882, she emigrated to Rochester, Minn., and on Jan. 2, 1890, at the same place was united in marriage to Chris Jenson. They came to North Dakota, locating four miles northeast of Valley City, where they lived for seven years, when they moved to their present home two miles northeast of Luverne, where they have since resided.

The deceased was a woman of most amiable character and in the passing away of Mrs. Jenson, the community has suffered a distinct loss, and her absence from our midst will be keenly felt by her loved ones and friends.

Her unnumbered kindnesses will ever be remembered by the ones left to mourn her departure. She was a most loving wife and mother, most hospitable to her friends and acquaintances. Their home might appropriately be called an "Orphan's Home," besides rearing their own family, they were ever ready to make a home for the fatherless and the motherless, when she was taken with her last illness, she was taking care of two such children, and others were welcomed there at their leisure times. Many from their home beyond the ocean have here found a pleasant home, when friendless in a foreign land.

Together with a sorrowing husband, deceased is survived by her daughter, Mrs. L. A. Nybo, of Culbertson, Montana, (one daughter having died at Valley City) and two sons, James and Wilhelm, besides a large circle of friends, in Luverne and surrounding communities.

The high esteem in which she was held was testified by the great number, who witnessed the service.
