LITTLE HAVANNA, N. D., BOY LOST IN RAIN STORM

Havana, N. D., June 19.—The little 4-year-old son of Lewis Laymond, who lives in the hills about six miles east of town, strayed from his home a few evenings ago and was unable to find his way back, and he was forced to remain out in the severe rain storm all night. It rained throughout the whole night, besides being bitter cold.

There was a very heavy fog in the hills that day, which made it very hard for anyone to see a great distance, and it was thought that this was why the boy was unable to find his way back home. He was playing out in the pasture near the house with other children, and, childlike, began wandering away without being noticed by the rest of his playmates. The other children went into the house after a while and Mrs. Laymond noticed that her son was not among them, so she went out and called for him. She did not receive any answer, but she did not realize then that he was lost, and went out to look for him. She searched for some time but was unable to find a trace of him.

Mrs. Laymond was thoroughly aroused by this time, so she called her husband. Mr. Laymond immediately called on a number of neighbors to help in the search and together they went out to look for him. The search was continued until 12 o'clock that evening, and by this time many of them were forced to go back on account of the cold for all were nearly frozen. The little boy was out in all this, barefooted, with only a light sweater on.

The little fellow was found by a few who kept up the search, about 5 o'clock that morning in a gulch quite a distance from the house, sitting among a clump of bushes. The light sweater which he was wearing, he had wrapped around his bare feet to keep them warm. When asked if he had went to sleep, he answered: "No, it was too cold to sleep." He does not seem to be any the worse for his experience.
