New Plan of the Associated Charities Is Fully Explained

At a meeting of the Associated Charities held Sunday afternoon in the basement of the library, it was decided to carry on the work this year by committees.

The motion stands: "That the work of the Associated Charities for the year 1916 be carried on by a relief committee and a labor employment bureau committee and such other committees as may from time to time be found necessary."

The relief committee is to be composed of a chairman and a representative from each of four wards, who in turn can choose two assistants to do the relief work of their ward.

The secretary was instructed to cast a unanimous vote for Carl Olson as chairman of the relief committee.

Of the four wards divided by Fifth avenue and the N. P. track the following were unanimously elected by first ballot: First ward, southwest, Mrs. Zetterberg; Second ward, northwest, Mrs. Hedstrum; Third ward, southeast, Mr. Eberly; Fourth ward, northeast, Mrs. Engen. These four each with two assistants and the chairman, making a committee of nine, compose the relief committee of the Associated Charities for the year 1916.

C. C. Chaffee has very generously offered the basement of his store for the use of the organization for this year to serve as a receiving and distributing depot. Federal Court Is Postponed

Minot, Nov. 2.—The term of the United States district court which was to have opened in this city this morning, was adjourned until Nov. 16. The adjournment is made necessary because of the grand jury term of the court which is being held at Fargo, and which has not yet completed the docket at that point.

Deputy Marshal Morstad was the whole court this morning, with Postmaster Stenwick as the hearers. Solemnly and in stentorian tones the marshal proclaimed "Hear ye! Hear ye! The district court for the district of North Dakota stands adjourned until the sixteenth day of November." The postmaster says the marshal hired him to go up and listen to the marshal practice, but the marshal denies the charge. Except for Mr. Stenwick, the proclamation was made to thin air.
