**CAPITAL REMOVAL PETITIONS ARE OUT**

New Rockford People Start the Circulation of Petitions for Removal of North Dakota Capital.

**"LET THE PEOPLE VOTE ON IT--- THAT'S FAIR" IS THEIR SLOGAN**

Decision of the People Wanted on the Question of the Location of the New Capitol Building Which Must Soon Be Erected.

**NO ADDITIONAL EXPENSE INVOLVED IN PROPOSED CHANGE TO A MORE SATISFACTORY LOCATION**

New Rockford, N. D., Jan. 11.—The campaign for the securing of signatures on the petition asking that the people be allowed to vote on the question of moving the state capital from Bismarck to the more central location at New Rockford at the general election next November, has been launched by the Capital Removal Association of North Dakota, and it is meeting with great favor wherever it has been presented.

Twenty-five per cent of the legal voters in at least half the counties of the state must be secured and the petitions must be in the hands of the secretary of state before May 7th next.
