### Mandan Farmer Guilty of Attempt on His Son's Life

Mandan, Jan. 15.—John Braun, who has been on trial in the district court at Mandan for attempting the life of his son, was found guilty by the jury late Saturday night. The penalty is a penitentiary sentence of from one to five years, as the presiding judge may deem necessary.

The evidence taken yesterday was damaging to the defendant, but that taken during the day was far more convincing to the jury and when the case was given over to the 12 men, it did not take very long to come to a verdict of guilty. Bergeson, Burnett & Langer prosecuted the case, and Attorney Murtha defended Braun.

Frank Braun, when called to the stand, told of the father continually threatening to kill him and other members of the family. He corroborated the story of his younger brother, Nick, in every particular in connection with the fight they had with their father and of the shooting for which he is on trial. Frank declared that a few days before the shooting his father had thrown a kettle full of hot water on him.

Peter Lenhart, a son-in-law of the defendant, testified that he had lived with the Brauns for ten months and in that time had repeatedly heard John Braun threaten various members of the family. He told of the father throwing axes and a pitchfork at one of the boys.

New Haven, Conn., Jan. 15.—Danger of foreign aggression will confront the United States after the European war is over, no matter which side wins, Hudson Maxim, member of the naval advisory board, declared in an address before the Chamber of Commerce here tonight.

He made an appeal for a larger army and navy, declaring that any of the great foreign nations now at war would "have available several million war-tried veterans for a trial at arms with us."

"When the great war is over, whichever side wins, there will be sure to arise before the winners and ourselves serious complications to be adjusted," Mr. Maxim said. "Either Germany or England would have a navy far superior to our own, and consequently could not successfully be opposed by our navy."

"Our enemy would be able to land upon our shores at least a quarter million men inside a month and after that continually bring re-inforcements at the rate of 250,000 a month, if they should happen to be required. Our little, poorly equipped army would not be able to offer resistance enough to make a ripple in the line of the enemy's advance. Our army would be just about one good day's killing."

If the enemy landed at either New York or Boston, the speaker said, they would be able in two weeks to capture the area in which the great arsenals navy yards and munition factories of the country are situated. Continuing, he said:

"Adequate preparation made in time of peace not only insures the safety of the country if war should come, but also it equally insures against the coming of war. History has taught no surer lesson than that wealth and defenselessness form an enticement posted on the walls of every home for an avicious enemy to break and enter."

### American Soldier Taken From Vessel by British

New York, Jan. 14.—Albert Clarke, a private in the Fifth infantry, was removed from the steamship Santa Maria at Jamaica by a British neutrality officer according to passengers who arrived here aboard the ship. After being detained ashore several hours Clarke was allowed to return to the ship and proceed here.

This is said to be the first time a United States soldier has been removed under similar conditions from an American vessel since the war 1812. The Santa Maria flies the American flag.

At Jamaica, en route, a British officer boarded the vessel and closely questioned all passengers as to their nationality. Clark said he was born near Vienna, but had taken out his first American citizenship papers some time ago.

The neutrality officer left the ship without commenting on Clark's case, but soon afterward the passengers said three negro soldiers in uniform boarded the Santa Maria and told Clark to accompany them ashore. Subsequently Clark said he was taken to what is known as the lower concentration camp on the outskirts of Jamaica, and there closely questioned by the commanding officer.

While he was absent American passengers on the Santa Maria decided to appeal to the American consul, but before this could be done, Clarke returned. Clark said he would make a full report to the war department. He had just finished 19 months' service in the canal zone, and was proceeding in full uniform to the adjutant general in Washington.
