**BAN ON LIVESTOCK LIFTED**

Bismarck, March 6.—State Veterinarian Crewe announces that the bars against livestock from South Dakota to this state have been let down.

Railroad companies joined with the settlers in an application for the change, because many persons had applied for cars for immigrant moveables. The new order will not only mean a greatly increased business for the railroads, but an increase in the population of North Dakota.

The great crops raised in North Dakota in 1915 have attracted national attention. Farmers of states to the south have learned that acre for acre the \$25 and \$50 land in this state will produce as much or more cash returns than the \$100 to \$150 an acre land in other states.

North Dakota is attracting many settlers not only from South Dakota but from other midnorthwestern states.

**Kathryn Is Big Stock Shipper**

Litchville Bulletin: More than 500 carloads of stock were shipped out of Barnes county in 1915. Figuring each car as worth \$1,000, which is a very conservative estimate, this would make over half a million dollars received by the Barnes county farmers for this one year. Below we give the official figures for every station in the county except Eckelson and Rogers. The figures for Valley City are approximate as the lordly representatives of the railroads at that place refused to give out the figures when approached by County Agent Mayland. Kathryn, which is primarily a stock country, leads the list with 135 cars. Valley City comes second and Litchville third.

**TO DECIDE LOCATION OF PLANT BY JUNE 1**

Fargo, March 5.—The location committee for the proposed Equity packing plant—Anthony Walton of Minot, P. M. Casey of Lisbon, and C. J. Lee of Valley City—have completed the work of visiting the various cities which are bidding for the plant.

During the past week they have visited Bismarck, Mandan, Jamestown, Valley City and Wahpeton, and have looked into the various offers of these cities. They were in Fargo yesterday and Mr. Walton stated that they were given a very cordial reception all along the line. The people of Wahpeton were particularly enthusiastic and took great pains in showing the committee why the plant should be located there.

Kathryn Recorder: Died, at her home three miles southeast of Kathryn, Mrs. Thora Johnson, Sunday morning, Feb. 20, 1916, aged 55 years, two months and twenty-seven days.

The cause of death was heart failure. While Mrs. Johnson had not been in robust health, she retired as usual Saturday evening and ere next morning's sun her spirit had passed to the Great Beyond.

Funeral services were held from the house before the remains were conveyed to Waldheim church, followed by a large number of neighbors and friends who came to witness the last rites and pay their last respects to the departed.

At the church services were conducted before interment. Floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. Rev. Berger officiated.

Mrs. Thora Johnson was born in Storhammer, Norway, Nov. 23, 1860. She came to this country with her parents in the year 1868 where she lived until the year 1881, when in company with a sister she came to Valley City, where she worked for some time. Dec. 13, 1883, she was married to Fred Johnson and became his faithful helpmate on the old homestead in the Sheyenne valley, sharing with him the privations and joys which were a part of pioneer life in those early days.

**GOOD ROADS ENTHUSIASTS AND FARMER AUTO BUYERS**

Is North Dakota prosperous? It certainly would seem so if we are to judge by the auto sales at the fifth North Dakota auto show at Grand Forks, in February.
