Many New Settlers Are Locating at Wimbledon

Wimbledon News: New settlers have been arriving in large numbers lately. During the past two weeks scarcely a day passed but the streets are lined with loads of household goods, and implements, the property of the newcomers, who are unloading the same from the cars and taking it out to their respective farms which they recently purchased in this vicinity. Most of the newcomers come from Iowa and Illinois, and are brought here by the Dennstedt Land Co.

The big farms are apparently doomed. They are being cut up in the same proportion with the stream of new settlers. The Baum and White farm north of town, consisting of 1700 acres has been cut up into eight different farms, which means eight different farm homes where there was but one. The Wm. Jones farm of 6000 acres is rapidly being cut up, as many as fifteen smaller farms have already been cut out of it and besides there are several thousand acres left for the original owner. There are several other smaller farms consisting of a section or more which the Dennstedt Land Co. has divided and dealt out to new settlers. A large number of new farm houses will be built this spring.
